Just a few words to let you know that ole C. U. had some representatives at the world important Atomic Bomb tests here at Bikini Atoll in the Marshall Islands. Another Creighton alumnus whom I saw out here is Dr. DiPersio, MD '45.

As for the tests, our ship, which has a great number of scientists aboard, was about twenty miles or less away from Bikini at the time the bomb was dropped. Needless for me to say, we had a "ringside seat" and were able to see the whole show. It was, indeed, a sight to see and a great experience. About eight hours later our ship put into Bikini collecting scientific data, etc. You have probably heard and read more about the tests than I can tell you so I won't bother to narrate details.

There are thousands of high officials from the United States and other countries here witnessing this very important operation. I hope this "crossroads operation" convinces them, as it did me, that the world cannot survive an atomic war.

Still other thousands have volunteered for post war military service for the reward of future educational benefits.

DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM REACHES \$450,000

THE first phase of Creighton University's long-range Development Program, announced last June, has already brought in \$449,672.34 in cash and pledges on a five year plan—from alumni.

The present sum represents contributions from only 569 alumni and former students, out of a total of nearly 11 thousand former Hilltoppers.

"We're proud of the way our alumni are responding to our appeal," says the Very Rev. William H. McCabe, Creighton's president. "Not only have they contributed to the Development Program in a financial way, but they are training themselves to be future salesmen of Creighton."

The alumni campaign is being conducted on a close personal contact basis. Teams of former students have been organized, with leaders working directly with the director of the program, the Rev. Henry W. Linn, S.J., executive secretary to the president of Creighton.

Committees were organized in each school only six months ago. Preliminary work has been done in the Omaha area, and the program now is expanding to other parts of the country, particularly among graduates of the School of Medicine.

Creighton Prep graduates are being organized under the direction of the Rev. Bernard J. Murray, S.J. Prepsters who attended university will be able to work in either campaign according to their preference.

Father Linn, Father McCabe, and the Rev. Harry B. Crimmins, S.J., reagent of the School of Medicine, attended the American Medical Association convention in San Francisco last July and laid organizational foundations among the doctors there.

Father Linn spent an additional several weeks on the coast, traveling between San Francisco and San Diego, explaining the program to alumni there and enlisting their aid.

Since that time, accompanied by prominent medical alumni, he has been to Detroit, traveled through the western part of Nebraska, to Denver, and other parts of the West.

In the offing is a journey to the East after the first part of the year.

Objectives of the campaign are new buildings and increased endowment. Father McCabe has outlined the building needs of the University as follows:

A new School of Medicine, a new building for Creighton Prep, a new College of Commerce, a new Science Building and new dormitories.

Trust funds have been set up in Medicine, Law and Dentistry. Contributions to other schools will be allocated as designated by the donor.

A tabulation of contributions thus far received is expected to be completed in time for the next issue of the ALUMNUS.

"Every man deserves recognition for his loyalty to the University," Father Linn said. "Therefore, we plan to publish periodic reports on the names of contributors. Amounts of contributions will not be made public, since the man who may give only a small amount is doing his best, and deserves our thanks as much as those who are able to contribute more."

Father Noonan Celebrates Golden Jubilee; Makes Third Trip to Rome General Assembly

Way back in 1902, just eleven years after Creighton conferred its first college degrees, the Rev. Herbert C. Noonan, S.J., came to the Hilltop to teach as a young scholastic.

On August 19, Father Noonan celebrated his 50th anniversary as a member of the Society of Jesus.

A lot of things happened to Father Noonan in the intervening years. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1909, received his Master of Arts degree in 1918 and his Doctorate in Philosophy from the Gregorian University in Rome in 1931.

He returned to his Alma Mater, Marquette University, in 1915, and served there as president for six years. Father Noonan came back to the Hilltop in 1931, and has served here continuously since that time as the head of the department of Philosophy.

He gained fame as a outspoken opponent of the "new morality," and many a former Hilltopper remembers

Heading the school committees are: Creighton College, Arthur L. Coad, Arts '06; Medicine, Louis D. McGuire, MD '17; Commerce, John P. Father McCabe says that Creighton expects the 1950 Hilltop enrollment to reach more than twice the totals of the 1940 registration. That would mean nearly four thousand students roaming the campus three years from now.

Present registration is 2,944 . . . and the walls of the university are bulging with students, making present buildings and current endowment inadequate.

"The endowments which the Creightons so generously bestowed on us so many years ago are no longer sufficient," Father McCabe said. "And so we must appeal to our loyal alumni."

well his denunciations of communism and materialistic atheism.

The celebration of his Golden Jubilee brought no rest to Father Noonan, however. In fact, he celebrated by announcing that he was leaving two days later on a flight to Rome. He was selected as a delegate to the general convocation of the Society of Jesus to elect a new Father General for the order.

Father Noonan made the trip in company with the Very Rev. Joseph P. Zuercher, S.J., former Creighton president now provincial of the Missouri Province. This was the third general assembly Father Noonan attended.

The seventy-one year old priest remarked that he enjoyed the flying trip. After a thirty day delay in securing reservations for the eight Jesuits in the American delegation, they took off from Rome on a Friday and Father Noonan arrived in Omaha the following Sunday morning.

REV. MATTHIAS B. MARTIN, S.J., has succeeded Father Gerald FitzGibbon as dean of Creighton College. He was formerly principal of Campion High School.

Ordained in 1937, Father Martin served for a time as assistant dean of St. Louis University's College of Arts and Sciences. He is a native of Mt. Hope, Kansas, and entered the Society of Jesus in 1925.

For the first time in history, Creighton College now has an assistant dean. He is the Rev. Ralph H. Schenk, S.J., a former Army chaplain.

The new assistant dean taught at Creighton Prep during his scholastic days from 1935 to 1937. Father Schenk served more than two years as an Army chaplain, and was placed on inactive duty as a major in September. He saw duty with a combat engineer group of the Ninth Army and went through the Central European and Rhineland campaigns.

Frank E. Marrin, long-time Hilltop mathematics instructor, took over a new post on August 11.

He was named director of Creighton's Veterans Service, succeeding Dr. Kenneth H. Thompson.

Dr. Thompson accepted a similar post at Berea College, Kentucky.

Mr. Marrin joined Creighton's staff in 1920, and last year was honored at the Founders' Day dinner for his 25-

year service. He received his undergraduate and master's degrees from Creighton.

With more than 1,800 veterans attending classes on the Hilltop, Mr. Marrin has his work cut out for him, but his long experience in dealing with students has stood him in good stead. In addition, his work as a "father-confessor" to the war-time aviation students has given him the background necessary to cope with his current problems.

Creighton got a new registrar on August 21 when Father McCabe announced the appointment of Jack N. Williams, BS '40, to that position.

He succeeds Miss Claire McDermott who retains the post of assistant registrar.

Mr. Williams joined the headquarters of the Federal Bureau of Investigation soon after his graduation from the Hilltop, and served in Washington, D.C., as a special agent.

Miss McDermott and Mr. Williams combined to handle the Hilltop's record enrollment without a hitch on registration day. The 2,944 students passed through the doors with a minimum of delay.

The registrar's office force has been greatly expanded to take care of the swarm of applications that have swamped the Hilltop since the end of the war.

Enrollment Hits 3,000 1,820 Veterans in School

The Hilltop's policy of giving registration preference to veterans from the Creighton area paid dividends this fall when 2,944 students enrolled.

Frank E. Marrin, director of the Hilltop's Veterans Service, announced that 1,820 ex-servicemen are attending classes.

Sharpest increase in registration occurred in Creighton College, which now has 1,005 students, an increase of more than 400 per cent over the total last fall.

The School of Law and the College of Commerce reported similar registration increases. In the College of Pharmacy, Dean William A. Jarrett has trouble keeping track of 144 registrants.

University College enrolled 174, Journalism 99, the Graduate School 50, St. Catherine's and St. Joseph's Schools of Nursing, 279. Medicine has 240.

Classes are being held in the auditorium, Moot Court, and the Union rooms in order to accommodate the record student population. In addition, the customary Adult Education classes have been dropped in order to schedule regular classes late in the evening.

HICKEY RETURNS TO BASKET BALL WARS

FOR the first time since the end of the 1942-1943 basketball season, Head Coach Eddie Hickey has picked up the reins of a Bluejay cage team.

After more than three years in the Navy, Coach Hickey returned to his Hilltop chores in September. He was placed on inactive duty as a lieutenant commander.

The cage outlook turned a rosy hue on registration day when five of Coach Hickey's pre-war letter men enrolled for the fall term.

Four of them—Ward Gibson, Pinky Knowles, Bob Salen, and Gene Lalley—were stars on the last Jay quintet, along with All-Americans Ed Beisser and Swede Langer. That was the crew that copped the Missouri Valley crown, and were favorites in the National Invitational meet held in Madison Square Garden.

The fifth pre-war letter winner is Norman Engelbretson.

Along with that array of talent, the Hilltop tutor has at hand three stand-outs from "Duce" Belford's first post-war quintet of 1945. Subby Salerno, Bill Harvey, and Jerry Caveny.

Hickey's call for cage candidates brought out some outstanding high school stars of recent years. Included in the group are Ray McAuliffe and Bob Gradoville, from Creighton Prep; Hermie Myers, former All-State, All-City center from Omaha South; and Joe Hebenstreit, brother of Creighton's famed Frank Hebenstreit.

Right now, the Jay mentor's main worry is his cagers' lack of height.

Gone are the skyscraping days of Ed Beisser and Willard Schmidt. Hickey's current choice at center—Ward Gibson—just tops the 6-foot, 4-inch marker, and the rest of the squad tapers down from there.

Adding to Hickey's woes is the news from arch-rival Oklahoma A. & M. that Coach Henry Iba can field three

complete teams averaging better than 6-feet, 6-inches. On top of that, the Aggies are reputed to have a skyscraping center to match last year's All-American Bob Kurland.

Nevertheless, the diminutive Jay coach has issued a warning that Creighton is out to regain the Valley crown relinquished at the close of the 1942-1943 season. The Aggies have won the loop laurels since the Bluejays gave up competition to go to war.

Current nominees for Hickey's starting five are Ward Gibson at center; Subby Salerno and Bob Salen at the forward posts, with Pinky Knowles and Gene Lalley at guards.

Rounding out the squad are Norman Engelbretson, who is alternating with Salen and Salerno; Bob Gradoville, Ray McAuliffe, Dick Wiedenfeld, John Wiedenfeld, Jerry Caveny, Gilbert Evans, Herman Myers, Jim Karabatsos, Joe Hebenstreit and Bill Harvey.

Promising Jay Quintet Wins Season Openers

Coach Hickey's first post-war edition of the Bluejays made an auspicious debut December 6 against Washburn's Ichabods.

When the fray was over, the Hilltoppers were on the long end of a 41-35 count, and Creighton fans were dreaming great dreams.

Hickey's first five, though still showing signs of rustiness after the wartime layoff, displayed enough potency to give promise of a successful season.

Ward Gibson, 1942-1943 star at guard now shifted to the pivot post, led the scorers with 13 points. The famed Hickey fast break was in action only a few times, because of the prolonged whistle-tooting of the officials.

Improvement in the second game, evidenced by a 44-25 count over Central Missouri State College, was marked. Time after time, Salerno, Knowles, and Lalley stole the ball and went whistling down the floor to rack up two points. Ailing Bob Salen, suffering from a heavy cold and bruised hip, contributed a large share to his mates' success by his accurate passing and fiery floor game. Again Gibson paced the scorers, this time with 11 markers.

The Jay first stringers played only 28 minutes of the game, leaving the floor with the count 30-14. The reserves, in for needed seasoning, carried on, with Jim Karabatsos and Frank Gilchrist spear-heading the attack and Dick Wiedenfeld and Ray McAuliffe setting the defensive pace.

Jays Stage Clinic

Broken Bow, Nebraska, was host to Coach Eddie Hickey and his Bluejay basketballers December 2 in the first of several cage clinics carded by Creighton's little headmaster.

The Jay tutor ran his charges through a day-long exhibition and demonstration of offensive and defensive tactics and fundamental drills. In the evening, the cagers staged a game-length intra-squad scrimmage for more than 450 Nebraska high school coaches, players, and officials.

Man-behind-the-scenes for the successful clinic was Henry "Fox" Bristowe, AB '41, former journalism instructor on the Hilltop.

WOW BRINGS TELEVISION TO HILLTOP

A total of \$40,000 worth of television equipment is slated to be moved on the Hilltop campus in the next few weeks.

The sight-sound apparatus is coming to Creighton under the auspices of radio station WOW, which is doing experimental work in the field.

Under the plan announced jointly by Creighton's president and John J. Gillin, LLB, '31, general manager of WOW, the station's engineering and production crews will install the equipment in the Hilltop auditorium.

Actual programs presented by Creighton's Radio and Television Guild will be televised. Plans also call for picking up various athletic events in the stadium and gymnasium. Receivers will be located in the auditorium.

The video equipment will be of the latest type available. It includes two image Orthicon television cameras and associated control apparatus, complete sound pick-up equipment, and six receivers. There will also be a complete micro-wave relay system to send the images from various points not on the ordinary co-axial cable.

The experimental program will be under the direction of Joseph Herold, technical supervisor for WOW; Russ Baker, production manager for the station, and the Rev. Roswell C. Williams, S.J., director of radio education on the Hilltop.

As soon as the experimental set-up is functioning, demonstrations will be conducted for university and radio station officials. They will be open to the public later.

Christmas Greetings From Father McCabe

Dear Creighton Alumni:

In Father Lord's latest annual Christmas booklet, an old priest whose prose-poetry language tells you where he was born long before he tells you himself, leads you with him by a sketch of what the first Christmas meant to those near by the Manger where God lay in the guise of a little Child. That was Mary's moment, and Joseph's, and the singing angels', and the shepherds' ("bless their eager hearts and their listening ears, and their swiftly running feet").

It was a moment tremendous too for the dwellers in near-by Bethlehem, "had their hearts been less hard than the cobbles of their Roman roads, and their ears less weary with too much nonsense, and their feet less tired with running after the things not worth the catching. Poor lads that they were—and for that matter, poor maids and matrons, poor old men and children. They laughed vacantly, with little cause for mirth, and played foolishly, with little excuse for joy, and slept long and heavily because life was so empty, and cooked vast dinners for tiresome relatives who never repaid the hospitality. And all the while their hope and their salvation, and reason enough and cause enough for all the joy in the world was waiting for them just a short walk away. Poor little Child that waited and waited in vain!"

Dear Creighton Alumni, read once again this sketch of an undiscerning population, thinking not of Bethlehem but of Omaha or Council Bluffs or Yankton or Casper or Bismarck or Potomac or New York or San Francisco; and not of that first Christmas but of Christmas, 1946; and see to it that the poor little Child does not wait for you this year in vain.

May He receive you kindly, and bless richly you and yours and the University that mothered you!

ADDITIONS TO THE FACULTY

A lot of un-familiar faculty faces are roaming the campus these days. The record enrollment has brought the faculty body to a new high in quality and numbers.

Among new additions to the staff are:

Dr. Phillipos E. Papadakis, assistant professor of chemistry. Dr. Papadakis is a graduate of Columbia University, and served on the staff of New York University before coming to Creighton.

Dr. Morris Lev, MD '34, and Dr. Miles E. Foster, assistant professors of pathology. Both are war veterans. Dr. Lev served as chief of laboratory inspectors in the ETO, and Dr. Foster was chief of laboratory service and pathology at Camp Carson General Hospital.

To the biology staff came the Rev. Paul L. Carroll, S.J., former director of the department of biology at Marquette University, and William B. McEnery. Mr. McEnery formerly taught at Salisbury School in Connecticut.

Dr. Chester J. Antieau has joined the staffs of the College of Commerce and the School of Law. He holds a Doctor of Jurisprudence degree from the Detroit College of Law, and took graduate work at the University of Pisa.

New associate professor of economics in the College of Commerce is Dr. James A. Hart, formerly of the staff of

Fordham's Graduate School. Dr. Hart has six brothers who attended Creighton.

Now teaching philosophy and religion is the Rev. William L. Rossner, S.J., who has just completed his post-ordination studies in Cleveland.

Dr. Maurice W. Quigley, who was previously on the staff of the University of Minnesota, has joined the staffs of the Schools of Medicine and Dentistry. A former Army colonel, he will teach dental medicine and anatomy.

Three new members of the Pharmacy faculty are Dr. Elbert Voss, Francis Hermansky, BSP '40, and Anthony Becker, BSP '44. Dr. Voss taught at Duquesne and the University of Wisconsin before joining Creighton's staff. Hermansky served with the Coast Guard and Becker with the Navy during the war.

In the department of religion is the Rev. George E. McGalloway, S.J., formerly assistant pastor of the Church of the Gesu in Milwaukee.

Other new additions to the staff of Creighton's School of Medicine are Drs. Forest J. Austin; Jack Hayes, MD '40; Harry McCarthy, MD '37; G. Kenneth Muehlig; William D. O'Gorman; and Chester H. Farrell, MD '30. Dr. Austin and Dr. O'Gorman are graduates of St. Louis University, and Dr. Muehlig received his degree from the University of Michigan.

With the addition of these new instructors, the University's staff now numbers more than 325, with more expected to come to the Hilltop next semester.

evening, alumni had a chance to cast their ballots for new representatives and officers of Creighton's Alumni Council.

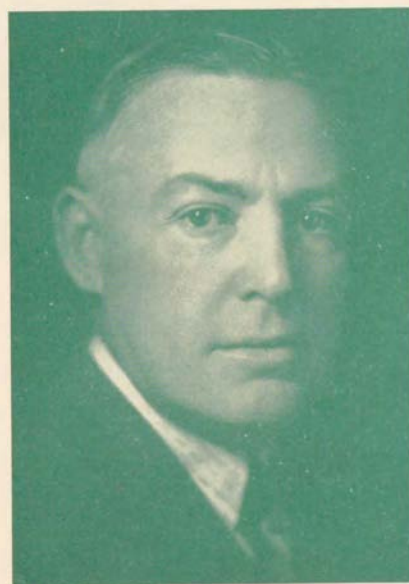

ALUMNI PROTEST TO UNITED NATIONS

Acting in protest of the treatment accorded the Yugoslavian prelate, Archbishop Aloysius Stepinatz, the Alumni Council adopted the following resolution which has been forwarded to the United States Delegation to United Nations.

"In the name of twelve thousand Creighton University Alumni living in all quarters of the United States, the following resolution protesting the recent trial and conviction of Archbishop Aloysius Stepinatz is conveyed to you for consideration and action by the United States Delegation.

"Whereas the recent trial and conviction of Archbishop Aloysius Stepinatz was a travesty against justice and frontal assault upon the common dignity of man;

"Whereas the legal treatment accorded this worthy churchman and

apostle was a coldly calculated weapon of religious persecution;

'Whereas Creighton men in the thousands fought and died in the hundreds to thwart the 'ugly truculency of dictators' along with the Yugoslavs' government, pledged to the same ideals,

"Be it resolved that the Creighton University Alumni Association protests to the United States Delegation, to the United Nations at Lake Success, New York, that this travesty on justice, this persecution of a churchman, this flagrant rejection of United Nations ideals be called to a close scrutiny before the assembly of the United Nations."

Association to Celebrate Twentieth Anniversary

Just twenty years ago the present Creighton University Alumni Association was being re-organized from the remnants of an older all-university association which was discontinued during the first World War.

On November 17, 1926, delegates of several school alumni groups met together at the invitation of Robert W. Burkley, AB '22, president of the Arts alumni association.

The Committee of Re-Organization, as it was called, met several times during December, modified the constitution of the previous Pan-Alumni Association and during January, 1927, the present Alumni group was formally organized.

The Committee on Re-Organization met on January 9, 1927 and its chairman, Dr. Bryan M. Riley, MD '00, appointed the first Council. This Council, meeting for the first time January 30, included representatives of the Medical, Dental, Law and Arts colleges.

Alumni of Creighton University had met and organized years before—the earliest record in the Alumni Office showing that a meeting was held in the "college hall" on June 10, 1892. The first constitution was adopted and the organization continued in activity for some years.

On January 1, 1914 the Pan Alumni Association was organized but World War I decimated its ranks and the association became inactive.

At present the Creighton Alumni Association is a well knit organization boasting 12,000 members.

Thursday Luncheons

An Alumni Luncheon club, meeting every Thursday noon in the Fontenelle Hotel, has been organized for Creighton graduates. The luncheon series gives Omaha alumni an opportunity to get together each week for an informal, chatty luncheon.

The principal feature of the meetings has been their brevity. No luncheon has adjourned later than one o'clock. The early dismissal hour is a strict rule with which all speakers have conformed willingly. Hence, busy alumni are assured of an early adjournment.

A series of programs has been planned starting with the December 19 meeting although, originally, the luncheons were intended to be no-program affairs.

All alumni are urged to put this Thursday luncheon on their calendar. Good food, a brisk program and a pleasant conversation with your alumni friends is available to you every Thursday.

Alumni visitors to Omaha are particularly invited to drop in.

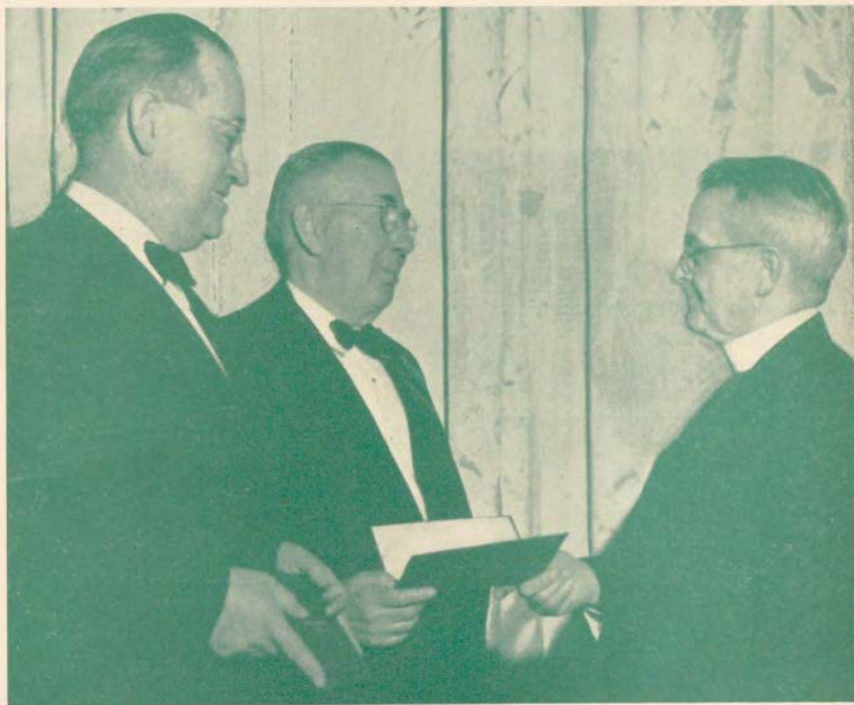
