Gregory Declares:

Anywhere Else, America Could  
Solution

Find Racial Problem

Lincoln, Nebr.—If any other country had the racial problems facing America, the United States could solve it, Comedian Dick Gregory declared here Wednesday.

"We would have the know-how, the personnel and the finances to find a solution to it anywhere but here," he asserted.

Gregory appeared before an overflow audience in the afternoon at the University of Nebraska and a turn-away crowd at an evening meeting at the Lincoln Hotel sponsored by the Lincoln

NAACP.

"Give Me Instant Freedom"

"We are fighting to give the Vietnams instant freedom and want to give the Negro freedom on the installment plan," Gregory explained. "Well, give me the

instant freedom and the Vietnam the Civil Rights bill.

He added:

"White people say the Negro doesn't have enough education to be free. But not one white man has said anything about the educational level in Vietnam.

He pointed out that Dr. Charles

Drew, a Negro who developed blood plasma, had bled to death in a southern hospital after a car accident because the hospital was

segregated.

Not Integrated Enough

"Don't tell me about getting educated," Gregory asserted. "Dr. Martin Luther King, Jim Farmer, Roy Wilkins, Whitney Young and many other Negroes are educated enough to be president. But America is not integrated enough.

Gregory was critical of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

"We didn't ask for a Civil Rights bill—we ask that the Con

stitution be carried out to the fullest," he said.

The bill was passed "not to

see that justice was done," Gregory said. "It was given because we were shattering business

and disturbing peaces."

Can't Vote Out Sheriff

Tuesday Gregory will go to Washington to discuss "loopholes we've found in the bill" with the Justice Department.

Under the Act, he said, a Negro can vote for a president in :

Federal election in Mississippi— "where a president hasn't been in 50 years—but can't vote the gun out of the sheriff's hand who's going to shoot him in the back some night."

The New York shooting of Malcolm X Sunday "is much, much bigger than people think," Gregory said.

Suggesting that maybe some whites might be involved, the comedian-civil rights worker declared:

"Anytime the FBI and Secret Service get involved this much in something, you can bet it isn't all colored people."

A Connection? . . .

He mentioned the recent plot involving several Negroes which allegedly involved blowing up the Liberty Bell and other national monuments with dynamite smuggled from Canada.

"I've been colored too long to think we're going to blow up the Liberty Bell," he said. "It's already cracked."

The Dynamite could have been secured to blow up "the entire meeting" of Malcolm's Sunday he said.

He noted that Malcolm had been barred from landing in France recently by General de Gaulle and that the girl caught smuggling the dynamite was a French-Canadian.

Not Enough Protection For King

Gregory was critical of the protection given to Elijah Muhammad, leader of the Black Muslim movement, who has been threatened.

"A Negro can't walk into the Chicago airport without 20 FBI McAllister Photograph.

Gregory quipped: "They do the same thing to us in Selma as you do to the Indians here

## Die In Vain

### Mrs. Evers Says

The widow of Medgar Evers, NAACP leader murdered in Mississippi in the summer of 1963, believes that her husband did not die in vain.

I do have the comfort of knowing some of the things he worked and died for have come about, such as some schools being integrated, hotels opened, and increased job opportunities," she says in the upcoming March issue of Ebony magazine.

Mrs. Evers, who left Mississippi to settle in a practically all-white community in California, says she made the move for the sake of her three children. Claremont, 30 miles outside Los Angeles, has only five Negro families among its population of 18,000. The community has made the Evers family feel welcome, Mrs. Evers says in the Ebony article.

The attractive widow who says "re-marriage is the farthest thing from my mind," told Ebony that if she had only herself to consider "I would have chosen to remain in Mississippi, to gamble with my own life on the world which cost Medgar his."

But her 10-year-old son Darrell, who saw his father die in a pool of blood, "suffered a great deal emotionally," Mrs. Evers told Ebony. Today the boy has been accepted by his new white friends in his new surroundings in California.

"When I look at the children, the progress they have made, the activities they are engaged in, the opportunities open to them, the way they have adjusted to the change, I feel I have made the right decision for them," Mrs. Evers declared.
