PROFESSIONAL NOTES: ■ **John M. Gleason**, professor of decision sciences, has been appointed to the International Advisory Committee for the annual International Conference on Industrial Engineering Applications and Practice. ■ **Dr. Marilyn Kielniarz**, assistant professor of fine and performing arts, presented nearly 50 Dalcroze eurhythmics classes between two national summer festival sites in Kansas City and Sacramento, Calif., for the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers. The Guild published her resource guide, "Dalcroze Applications for Handbells," in June, and has contracted her to produce seven articles on music theory for its national journal, *Overtones*. The first article will be published in the Nov/Dec 1997 issue with remaining series articles running in six following issues. ■ **Dr. Jeffrey R.
