FOR THE FOURTH straight year, *Money* magazine has ranked Creighton University among the nation's "best college buys." Creighton was the only Nebraska school and the only Jesuit university ranked among the top 100 values in the magazine's fourth annual Money Guide: Best College Buys. Creighton was ranked 87th among the top 100 values in higher education by the magazine, which analyzed 989 four-year colleges and universities for its 1994 edition. In its regional value rankings, *Money* rated Creighton 18th in the Midwest. Creighton moved up in the rankings for the 1994 edition. *Money* ranked Creighton 91st in the nation and 22nd in the Midwest in the 1993 edition. In comparing schools, *Money* weighed each school's cost against the quality of education it of-

fers. It considered factors such as student-to-faculty ratios, SAT scores, graduation rates, faculty strength, the percentage of graduates who go on to get their doctorate degrees, class ranks of incoming freshman, library resources, instructional budgets and student services budgets.
