Beginning with the cocktail hour at 5:30, eager alumni fell right into the post lenten spirit of things. With dinner scheduled for 6:30, the biggest problem at that time was to get the guests seated so the dinner could be served. Dental Alumni Attend Clinic

Drs. Lucas and Black main speakers

Over 150 persons attended the annual Spring Dental Clinic at Creighton University April 6. The clinic was held in conjunction with the meeting of the Omaha District Dental Society.

Dr. R. J. Yechout, DDS '25, president of the Omaha District Dental Society, acted as chairman of the all-day event. Dr. Herbert E. King, dean of the Creighton School of Dentistry, assisted Dr. Yechout.

The two main guest speakers were Dr. L. A. Lucas, DDS '30 of Oklahoma City, and Dr. Albert S. Black of the Creighton School of Medicine.

Dr. Lucas, 1930 graduate of Creighton Dental Society delivered a lecture and explained Kodachrome slides on the subject of "Root Canal Therapy." He is past president of the Oklahoma County Dental Society and has just been re-elected as representative to the State Society.

Dr. Black's lecture on Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery which took place at 8 o'clock P.M. at the Medical Arts Auditorium, was illustrated by moving pictures of all phases of plastic surgery. Dr. Black served on the staff at the Mayo Clinic for over five years prior to joining the Creighton Medical Staff last year.

Clare Booth Luce to Address June Graduates

*Prominent Author, Editor,
Correspondent and Congresswoman
will speak at Commencement*

Clare Booth Luce will deliver the Creighton University Commencement address next June 3. The announcement that Mrs. Luce would be the main speaker at the June commencement exercises was made by the Very Rev. William H. McCabe, S.J., president of the University.

Mrs. Luce is well known throughout the country and is prominent in several fields. She is noted as an author, lecturer, correspondent, playwright, and congresswoman. She is the wife of Henry R. Luce, editor-in-chief of *Time*, *Life*, and *Fortune*.

Father McCabe made the following statement concerning the selection of Mrs. Luce as main speaker for the June exercise: "I am sure that our Creighton students, their relatives and friends, and the people of Omaha will enjoy hearing a commencement message from a woman who has been so much in public life as has Mrs. Luce."

Mrs. Luce is a native of New York state and attended private schools in Long Island and Tarrytown-on-the-Hudson. She was graduated *summa cum laude* from the latter school at the age of fifteen, the youngest graduate in the school's history.

She entered public life when she was 18 campaigning in the cause of "equal rights for women."



In 1929 she went to work on the staff of "Vogue" magazine. Two years later she was made associate editor of "Vanity Fair" and in 1933 she became managing editor of the magazine.

She was married to Henry R. Luce in 1935 and went to work as a correspondent for *Life* magazine. As such she went to Europe in 1939, and later to the Philippines, Africa, India, Burma and China.

Mrs. Luce became active in politics during the 1940 Presidential campaign. She served two terms in Congress as Representative from Connecticut. During her terms in the 78th and 79th Congress she served on the House Military Affairs Committee and visited the Mediterranean and European war-fronts.

Mrs. Luce was received into the Catholic Church in February, 1946, and in 1947 wrote *The Real Reason*, the story of her conversion. She has written many books and plays, several of which have been produced on Broadway and later made into motion pictures.

She resigned from politics in 1947 and since then has confined herself to writing her own books and is presently engaged in a writing assignment for Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corporation.

Development Program

Nears Million Mark

Contacted Alumni pledge \$945,622; Cash contributions received total \$328,995

Not even the Internal Revenue Department has slowed down the mounting progress of the Creighton University Development Program.

Since the last report in the *Alumnus* the total in pledges has reached \$945,622; the cash received now totals \$328,995. At the rate the program is moving at the present time, the million dollar mark will be reached by the end of June. This total is even more impressive when one considers that the amount has been contributed by only 1684 alumni:

Dr. Wilbur Eaton . . . dead

Dr. Wilbur Eaton, Arts '29, former Omaha Athlete and Creighton football coach, died of a heart attack in a Newton, Iowa hospital March 7.

Dr. Eaton graduated from Creighton Prep, where he was outstanding as a football player. After graduating from Prep he went to Notre Dame where he played end under Knute Rockne. After graduating from Notre Dame in 1925, he coached the freshman team of the South Bend school.

In 1926 he was named Creighton Prep coach but he never took the post. Instead he became director of athletics and head football and basketball coach at St. Charles College in Helena, Montana.

In 1933 Dr. Eaton returned to Omaha to enter the University of Nebraska School of Medicine. He did not coach in 1934 but in 1935 he was named end coach by Marchie Schwartz at Creighton.

He graduated from Medical School in 1936 and began his practice in Plattsmouth, Nebraska. He joined the Army medical corps in 1941 and spent 22 months overseas in the South Pacific as a captain.

After the war he and his family moved to Colfax, Iowa where the doctor was engaged in practice at the time of his death. His body was returned to Dunlap, Iowa, his home town, for burial.

by Mrs. C. W. Hamilton; the contributions of Pharmacy, to be led by Dr. William A. Jarrett; and the contributions of Nebraska Writers, to be led by Dr. Leo V. Jacks.

The Conclusion of the Series will take place on Saturday, April 17. The leader for this program will be Dr. P. Raymond Nielson. Taking part in the discussion will be the Rev. Henry W. Casper, S.J., Dr. James A. Hart, Dr. Leo V. Jacks, and Dr. C. L. Kenny.

The programs are heard every Saturday afternoon at 1:30 over radio station WOW. William O'Holleran, PhB Jour, head of the continuity department of station WOW, produced the series. George Hey, instructor in English, is master of ceremonies, and the Rev. R. C. Williams, S.J., assistant professor of English, is the moderator of the Creighton University of the Air.

Dr. Stelios Samaras Added to Med Faculty

Dr. Stelios C. Samaras has joined the faculty of the Creighton University School of Medicine according to Dr. Charles M. Wilhelmj, Dean of Medicine. Dr. Samaras, a native of Greece, has been in the United States since last April.

Dr. Samaras is one of the pioneers in the field of atomic energy research. In 1937, while teaching at the University of Athens in Greece, he published a paper on the "Experimental Research on the Biological Properties of Heavy Water".

Dr. Samaras received his Doctor of Medicine degree "Cum Laude" from the University of Athens in 1932.

The New York Rockefeller Foundation in 1935 sent Doctor Samaras from his teaching duties at the University of Athens to the University of Freiburg in Germany, where he did general and experimental pathology research under the renowned Dr. Ludwig Aschoff.

He later received another fellowship, this time from the Grecian Stathato Foundation to carry on studies in clinical medicine and nutrition problems at the University of Munich. In 1939, he was forced to leave Germany and

return to the University of Athens because of the outbreak of World War II. Consequently, he continued his work under the Stathato's Foundation at the University of Rome for one year.

Dr. Samaras then joined the Greek Army and served as Director of the Medical Section of the Officer's Hospital. He held the rank of captain.

From 1942 until 1947 he was Professor of General and Experimental Pathology at the University of Salonika in Greece.

He has published over 15 scientific papers, many of them under the assistance of the Rockefeller Foundation.

New Program Offered

The Graduate School is offering a new program of studies leading to the Degree of Master of Science in Education. The new program has begun with the second semester of the academic year, 1947-48.

The degree is intended for those whose purpose in pursuing graduate studies is to gain background for their professional careers in the elementary and secondary schools.

The research aspects of graduate work will be minimized so that a rich background for their work in teaching may be acquired.

Church Colleges Meet

The annual one-day meeting of the Nebraska Association of Church Colleges was held at Creighton Saturday, March 20. Three hundred representatives from thirteen state colleges attended the meeting.

The Very Rev. William H. McCabe, S.J., president of Creighton and president of the Association presided over the meeting.

Speakers and discussion leaders included Chancellor R. G. Gustavson, University of Nebraska; Dr. R. L. Fredstrom, Nebraska Wesleyan; Dean F. E. Weyer, Hastings college; and Dr. P. Raymond Nielson, Creighton.

Chancellor Gustavson presented the opening address, stressing in his talk the importance of freedom for all the people of the world. He stated, "No one in the world is safe from starvation, disease or war unless all persons on the globe have plenty to eat, sufficient medical protection.

Student discussion, under the general subject of "The Church Colleges and the Foundations of Freedom," was divided into five groups.

All the discussions, including a faculty panel session led by Dr. Fredstrom, were held in the Law School Building.

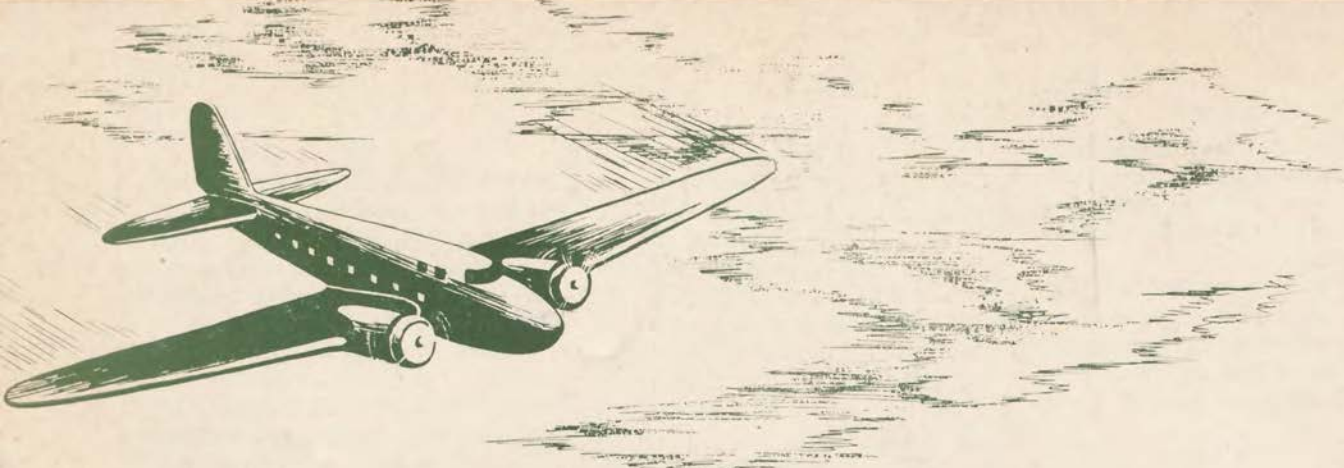
