Sioux City Fires Opening Gun of Creighton Campaign Accepts Quota and Makes First Contribution

Sioux City has gotten squarely behind the Creighton building and endowment campaign. The Sioux City Alumni, 100 per cent strong, have perfected their campaign organization, selected district and city chairman, and have gotten down to work.

Sioux City has accepted its full quota and has pledged itself to account for at least 100 per cent, and probably more, of that quota.

But that's not all Sioux City has done.

Sioux City has the honor of having secured and turned in the very first subscription to the Creighton building and endowment fund.

Other points will have to "go some" to equal that Sioux City record. And

Sioux City's Telegram to President McCormick.

Sioux City will have to go equally as fast to keep up with the pace already set by its Alumni.

There are just 21 Creighton Alumni in Woodbury county, Iowa, of which Sioux City is the county seat. And there were just 21 Creighton Alumni at the banquet on December 9, when the organization was completed, the quota accepted and the first subscription secured.

The banquet was held at the West hotel. At its close, Dr. H. F. McGrane, the sectional chairman, sent the telegram, reproduced on this page, to President McCormick of Creighton, accepting the quota, etc.

Sioux City's quota was set at \$51,200. That's \$4.00 for each alumnus in the Sioux City section. But the

alumni didn't bat an eye when the total was mentioned. They accepted it offhand.

There are 128 alumni in the Sioux City section. Forty-seven are in Iowa counties contiguous to Sioux City, 10 are in South Dakota and 71 in those Nebraska counties near to Sioux City.

In detail, the alumni of the Sioux City district are located as follows:

Iowa counties: Woodbury, 21; Crawford, 6; Plymouth, 6; Monona, 5; Sac. 4; Lyon, 2; O'Brien, 1; Sioux, 1; Ida, 1.

class of 1899, made the very first subscription to the Creighton building and endowment campaign. As soon as the committee accepted the total quota of \$51,200 and the individual quota of \$400 for each alumnus, Dr. Dougherty announced that he wanted to subscribe his quota right then and there, although no books had been opened and no individual subscriptions had been invited.

So Dr. J. P. Dougherty of Sioux City will go down in Creighton history as having been the very first to subscribe.

The Sioux City District chairman is Dr. H. F. McGrane, 3222 Jackson street, Sioux City. The Sioux City city chairman is Thomas J. Griffin, attorney, Iowa Building, Sioux City.

South Dakota Alumni Organizes and Goes to Work

South Dakota is not going to take a back seat for anybody when it comes to supporting Creighton's campaign for better buildings and more facilities for students as outlined in the Creighton \$2,000,000 campaign. That's what the Alumni of Sioux Falls, Yankton, and other points say.

South Dakota has already gotten together, formed a "section" and started to work.

Dr. T. J. Britton of Sioux Falls is sectional chairman. Robert Ronayne of Sioux Falls is sectional secretary and Dr. R. W. Mullen of Sioux Falls is sectional treasurer.

The Sioux Falls section and the Yankton section have combined for the sake of more concentrated efforts. Dr. H. A. Fitzgerald of Yankton and Dr. J. E. Trierweiler, Yankton, jointly, will head the Yankton section.

The Alumni of the Sioux Falls section held a banquet and "Creighton Campaign" meeting at the Cataract hotel in Sioux Falls, Friday, December 15, and selected sectional officers for the coming campaign. A. A. Coupland, Field Secretary of the Creighton campaign, outlined the plans for the enlarged Creighton University, told the alumni what plans were being

made for securing the funds, outlined the new buildings which are to be erected on Creighton campus, and what the additional endowment will be used for.

The Alumni were greatly impressed with the organization plans for Creighton and were immensely pleased with the Permanent Alumni Chapter feature.

So much enthusiasm was aroused at the banquet that whereas the guests sat down at the table at 6:30, the Field Secretary had to make a quick run to catch his train out of town at 10:05. The Alumni continued the

meeting nearly an hour after Mr. Coupland had gone.

Those who attended the banquet were Father W. J. Deneen, Columbus College; Dr. T. J. Billion, Dr. M. A. Stern; Dr. Frank J. Putnam; Dr. R. H. Mullen, Robert Ronayne; John H. Fitzgibbon, L. V. Ryan, and A. A. Coupland, Field Secretary of Creighton.

Of the remaining six alumni who live in Sioux Falls, four were out of the city and two, Rev. Paul McGuire and Rev. C. J. Garry, both of Columbus College, found it impossible to attend.

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OMAHA ORGANIZATION WORK UNDER WAY

Organization of the Omaha district for the big campaign is under way and is making real progress. The Finance Committee, upon which the success of the movement will depend so largely, has already been selected but cannot yet be announced. It can be said, however, that this committee is composed of five of the most representative business men in the city of Omaha. It is an interdenomination committee throughout. The names will be announced in the next number of the Courier.

The district organization in Omaha is also growing and chairmen are being selected to head the different committees. Charles P. Wonder is the chairman of District Number 6. Dr. J. H. Tompson is chairman of District Number 12, and E. J. Svoboda heads District No. 11. The chairmanship of other districts are being filled every day.

President McCormick of Creighton will very shortly call together a special committee to recommend men to be chairmen of the various committees which will have charge of the larger affairs of the campaign. These committees will probably be announced in the next issue of the Courier.

These organizations are being built up all over the country. Wherever there are two or three Creighton graduates, there will soon be found a chapter of the Creighton University Permanent Alumni Association. Where the alumni are badly scattered, a district headquarters will be established at some central point where the members of the association can gather now and then and discuss Creighton affairs, past and present, and can take an active part in directing the future of "Old Creighton."

BEATRICE ALUMNI WILL HELP FUND

Have Held One Meeting and Will Hold Another During Holiday Week.

Beatrice Alumni are getting in line for the building and endowment campaign and a permanent organization is to be effected immediately. Already a preliminary meeting has been held and another meeting, at which the permanent organization will be completed, will be held Wednesday evening, December 27. Intermural baseball games at Creighton started December 5 and will continue throughout January. All classes are eligible provided they make arrangements at the athletic director's office. Schabinger is impressing upon the students that Creighton is trying to promote athletics for the entire student body and not just for the Varsity teams.

The Kansas University team which Creighton will play is the team which last year tied Missouri University for the championship of the Missouri Valley. This is the last year of play for the entire squad with the exception of one player.

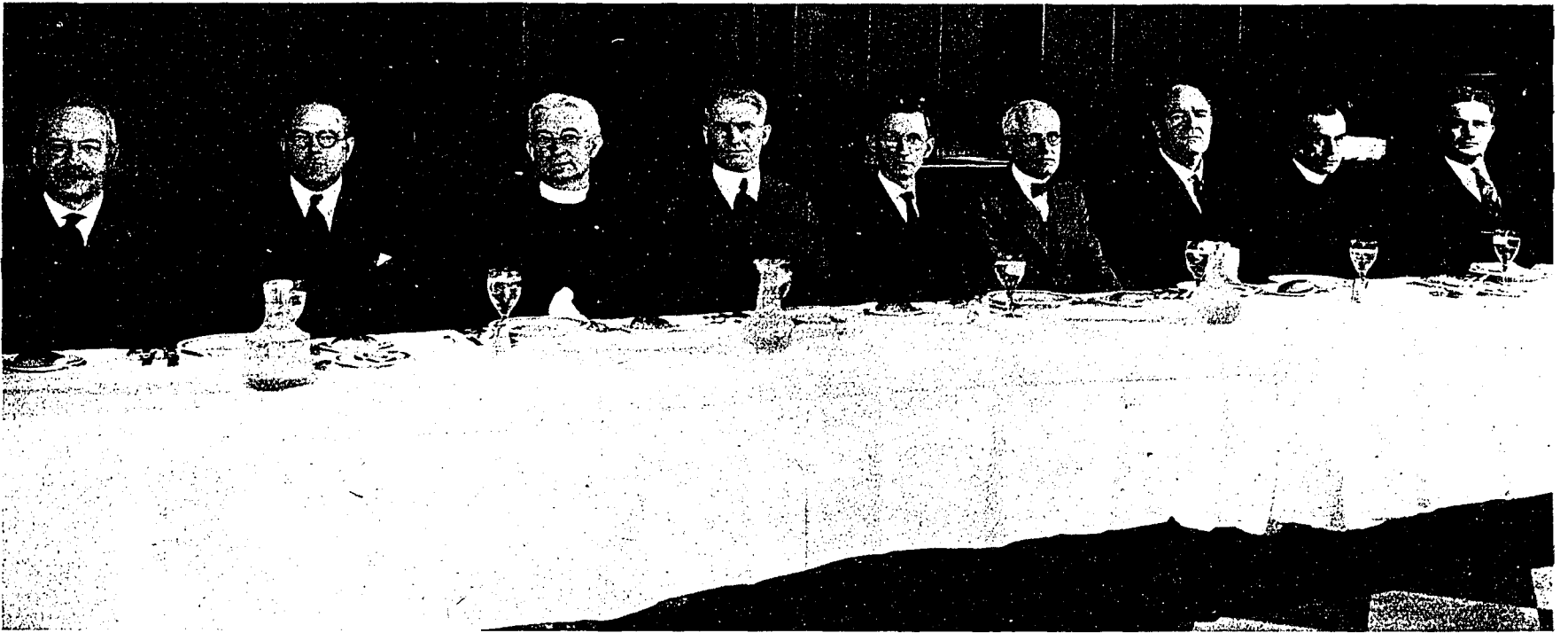

without a peer.

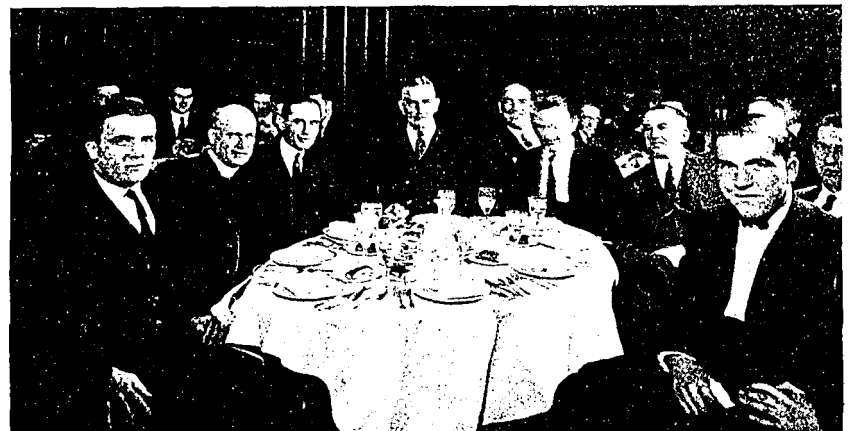
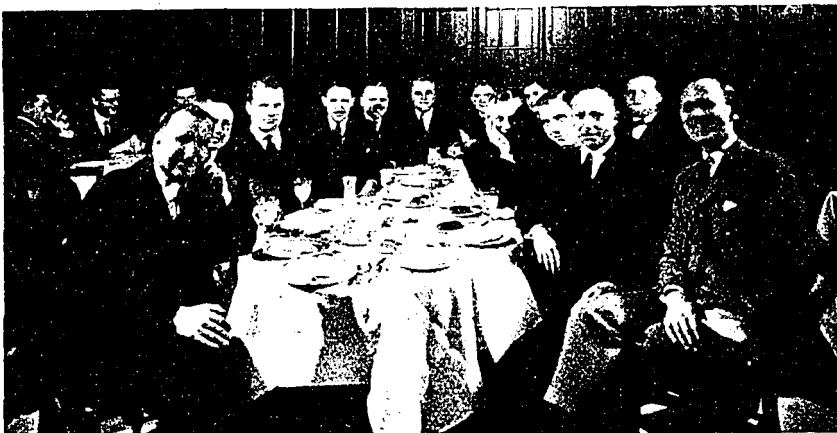
Let's call the roll—from Captain Bend-

CREIGHTON FOOTBALL, 1923 AND 1922

Creighton is going up against a pretty swift proposition in football next season. The schedule for 1923 is far stronger than that of the season just finished, says A. A. Schabinger, Athletic Director. And there are two open dates which may be filled in with a couple of really "hot" teams. Schabinger is not yet ready to announce the teams with which he is figuring to fill these dates, but he says if he lands those for which he is playing, Omaha will see the fastest article in football it has ever seen.

The dates and contracts already announced for 1923 are as follows:

October 6—Des Moines University at Omaha.

October 13—Kansas Aggies.

October 20—South Dakota State.

October 27—Open date, to be filled later.

November 3—Haskell Indians at Omaha.

November 10—Open date, to be filled later.

November 17—South Dakota University at Omaha.

November 24—Oklahoma Aggies.

November 29—Grinnell at Omaha.

One of the "open dates" games will be played in Omaha and the other probably in some other city, says Mr. Schabinger. Of the games already scheduled four will be played in Omaha and three in other cities.

Creighton's 1922 football season was the most successful in Creighton's history, despite the fact that Creighton did not win first place in the "Big Nine" conference.

The Missouri Valley Conference berth was the real prize for which Creighton was battling on the gridiron this year. For that berth Creighton changed all her athletic rules not in accord with the Conference rules, took her battered and depleted 1921 football team and without the addition of new blood, went onto the field to play ball under the rules of the Conference as the first step necessary to win a place where she can schedule games with the really "big" fellows. Creighton did not win her desired berth this year, but she played according to the conference rules and will do so again next year and the next and the next—until she wins recognition and takes her place among the big teams of the Missouri Valley Conference.

Only Lost Two Games

But even with her crippled team, Creighton did not do at all badly this season. Ten games played, seven won, two lost, one draw. Points made by Creighton, 111; lost by Creighton, 80.

True, the 1922 schedule was not a great one. It was not intended to be a great one. In adopting the freshman rule Creighton officials well knew that no fresh supply of football material could get in the 1922 team. So the schedule was made accordingly.

But the Creighton eleven did wonders for itself. It played hard, harder than Creighton has ever played before. It simply had to play hard to make a showing.

Even at that, experts say Marquette was the only team that really out-classed Creighton.

South Dakota State was the rock upon which Creighton's hope of the Big Nine pennant was dashed. And although South Dakota State made twenty-five points against Creighton's 14, the visitors won by getting the breaks in what was really an even battle.

Trims Mich.—Aggies

Creighton did herself proud when she trimmed the big Michigan Aggies—for the special benefit of the Creighton "Home Comers." It was 9 to 0 in favor of the Blue and White.

That Creighton Michigan—Aggies game is called the best article of football seen on the Creighton field in many seasons. Both teams were well coached and each side provided thrill after thrill.

J., who has edited the Creighton Courier so ably during the past two years, has turned over the publication of the Courier during the next four months to the Creighton Building and Endowment Association, so that it may be used primarily during this time for the advancement of the \$2,000,000 campaign for buildings and endowment. The managing editor during this period will be Mr. P. H. Bogardus, and the editor-in-chief, Mr. T. R. Porter.

It is hoped, by all of Father Bouscaren's many friends, that this freedom from his duties in connection with the Courier will improve his general health and that he will return with renewed vigor to take up the editorship of the Courier next April. In the meantime, we hope to have at least one editorial from him in each of the regular issues.

Madame Ziska, artist for the American Museum of Natural History, who came to Omaha lately to make illustrations of Dean Schulte's anatomical research work on the okapi embryo and on the lipotes, has presented to the College of Medicine a beautiful painting by herself of the adult okapi. The okapi is a quadruped of the Belgian Congo, half antelope and half zebra. A mounted specimen of the animal is in the American Museum of Natural History at New York, but so far as can be ascertained there is no living specimen in captivity.
