... Report on Enrollment

Judging from the comments I have heard from various Alumni here and there throughout the world there are two or three erroneous views of the enrollment situation in colleges and universities at this time.

You alumni of Creighton will be interested, I know, in the results of several studies made among the colleges themselves.

In the first place, statistics show that college enrollments are still high everywhere in the country. They also show that the peak of the veteran tidal-wave registration has now rolled up the academic ladder to about the sophomore or, in some cases, the junior year.

When the atom bomb blew Hiroshima and Nagasaki into smithereens and the United States soldier into a college classroom, Creighton did two things to handle those veterans. First, Creighton expanded its faculty, its facilities and its administrative set-up to accommodate three or four times as many students as it had during the war. Second Creighton established priorities which reserved a place in a Creighton classroom for qualified, deserving veterans. Creighton can be proud of the fact that no qualified veteran who applied for admission was turned away except in the Schools of Medicine and Dentistry where the presence of V-12 and ASTP trainees made it absolutely necessary. Creighton can be proud of the function of the University Veteran's Service which rustled up rooms (and they were pretty scarce items) for every single veteran and apartments for most of the married veteran-scholars.

Creighton was justified, I think, in giving such service and such priority-protection to veterans and I feel sure that you agree with me.

Now we are up to June 1948. Most of the veterans are in the junior and sophomore classes, at present, with more of them just getting around to entering college at the 1948 Summer Session and the 1948 Fall Session. But it is evident that the veterans no longer need the protection of favoring priorities to insure them a seat in class. Since this is evident, Creighton has taken away most of those priorities.

The situation as we look forward to the 1948 Summer Session and the 1948 Fall Session is this: Creighton can accommodate qualified students in Creighton College, University College, the College of Commerce, the School of Nursing, the College of Pharmacy. Both the Medical and the Dental Schools are still jampacked and probably will be for several years. The School of Law is still handling more students than ever before in its history, but because of the rate of "production" of graduates due to the accelerated schedule which the Law School has been on since the war, that School will, within two years probably, be able to accommodate those students who were regrettably turned away in the past few years.

Pledges and Cash Contributions

Raise Total in Development Program

One million dollar mark predicted by time of next report to Alumni

With pledges and cash contributions to the University Development Program totaling \$983,317.34 May first, the Rev. Henry W. Linn, S.J., Executive Secretary to the President and Co-Director of the Development Program, feels justified in predicting that the eagerly awaited million dollar mark will be reached by the time the next report is available to Alumni.

Of the grand total of \$983,317.34 which has been pledged to the Program, \$337,730.32 in cash contributions has already been received by the University.

The scope of the work is being broadened as alumni from the Schools of Law and Dentistry, the College of Pharmacy and graduates of Creighton Prep throw their weight and energies into the Program's organization. The reaction of alumni of these schools continues to encourage the committeemen and Father Linn, for these contacts with alumni have produced hundreds of voluntary testimonials of approval of the University's long-range policies, of the mode of operation of the Development Program and reassurances of loyalty and assistance in the years to come.

School of Dentistry

The Dental School Alumni committee has met several times in recent weeks. The twenty-three man group met at the home of Dr. L. D. McGuire, president of the Alumni Association on April 14 to prepare the blueprint of the Program work among Omaha Dentists. To facilitate the work of the committee Dr. Hugh McDonnell, DDS '28, was elected permanent chairman of the group. Dr. Walter W. Key, DDS '30, was elected permanent secretary.

At a meeting held May 3, at the American Legion Club, the committee

met for the first time under the direction of Dr. McDonnell for the purpose of completing its plans for the solicitation among Omaha Dental Alumni.

College of Pharmacy

Members of the Pharmacy committee also met at the home of Dr. L. D. McGuire. The first action of the committee was the election of Severin Walters, PHG '21, as chairman of a four man executive board. Henry Lee, PHG '14, Sam Ban, PHC '29, and Ted A. Connolly, PHG '26 complete the board.

The development of plans and schedules for the solicitation of all Omaha Pharmacy alumni was the first item of business on the committee's agenda.

School of Law

At least fifty percent of the Omaha alumni of the School of Law have been contacted by the Law Committee. The contacting of Omaha lawyers has been done quietly and effectively on the personal contact basis with all contact work being done by alumni of the School of Law.

School of Medicine

Members of the Medical Alumni "traveling committee" are continuing their work of personal visits to medics throughout the country. Twenty-six alumni of the medical school have offered to leave their offices and accompany Father Linn on trips throughout the nation.

Dr. Harold N. Neu, MD '35, will accompany Father on a tour of southwestern Iowa and Dr. John J. Grier, MD '31, will drive through northeastern Iowa with Father Linn.

Dr. Louis D. McGuire will accompany Father Linn on an extended trip through Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and North Dakota according to plans for the early summer. Dr. Sebastian Carnazzo will tour Oklahoma and those sections of Kansas which have not yet been visited.

Creighton Prep

Alumni and friends of Creighton Prep have been keeping the Junior Jay School's Program work well in pace with that of the University. Four organizations, working under the direc-

tion of the Rev. Bernard J. Murray, S.J., have secured over \$31,000 in subscriptions to the Prep building fund.

The four organizations which are assisting Prep are the Father's Club, the Thirty Club, the Mother's Club and the Alumnae Guild.

Nearly all of this amount has been raised from among the membership of these four organizations although some very welcome contributions have been received from non-alumni friends of the school.

Some Prep student activities such as plays and musical revues have also produced revenue for the building fund.

Looking ahead on the Development Program calendar Father Linn said that he hoped that the personal contact work in Omaha would be completed in the next three months.

"From past experience we have found that it is absolutely imperative to have the greater percentage of Omaha alumni in the Program before contacting alumni in other parts of the country," Father Linn pointed out.

Last month the students of Creighton were honored one Friday morning when Omaha's new Archbishop, The Most Reverend Gerald T. Bergan, said the weekly University Mass in St. John's Church.

In his address to the students he expressed his happiness at the thought of being associated with Creighton students in his future here in Omaha.

The Archbishop explained that he would not be able to attend the Creighton Commencement exercises as was hoped due to a trip to the orient with a former classmate of his, Cardinal Spellman.

A portion of his speech to the student body follows:

"We are gathered in the finest classroom possible because we are in the presence of Christ, the greatest teacher of all time.

"He will help you students with all your problems especially those problems of studies. He helped the poor, ignorant Apostles. He will help you.

"Men learn much more by listening to Christ than to the world.

"The world needs you men oh so badly. Who else can save the world but you who are grounded in those principles which will be able to bring peace, love and happiness to the world.

"You are the dearest of our flock. After you have completed your training under the dear Jesuit Fathers, the world will look to you to bring it out of its now deplorable condition.

"I say my Mass this morning for your intentions. Your family, teachers, choice of vocation; pray for peace—pray that the United States may be a good leader to bring the world out of chaos.

"May God bless this university, a powerhouse of the middlewest.

"Pray for your new Archbishop that he may have the Grace to fulfill his duties. If you pray for me, my success in Omaha will be assured.

"I'll see you often in the days to come, and our friendship will grow as time passes."

Bluejay Nine Opens Second Season Against Bradley

Going into the fourth week of play Creighton's baseball team has a won one, lost three record.

The Jays' win was over Omaha U. April 20, 1-0. The Blues have dropped games to Buena Vista and two to Bradley.

Finding some power hitters has been the main problem facing Coach Dick Ainslie. The only Jay to show much strength at the plate in the early games was shortstop Jim Karabatsos.

The Blues opened the season away from home at Bradley University of Peoria, Illinois. Here the Jays ran into the powerful bats of a team that already had 14 games under its belt. The Bradley nine had beaten such teams as Iowa, Michigan, Wisconsin and Notre Dame. They had also spent the first two weeks of the season down south.

In the first game on Friday April 16, the Jays went down 9-2. A bad first inning caused the Creighton nine trouble which was with them the remainder of the game.

After the fifth inning Lou Kubat, the Blues' top pitcher settled down, but the early run advantage won the game for Bradley.

On Saturday the Jays suffered their second straight defeat 5-0.

Errors were costly, blacking out the six hit pitching performance of first year man, Dick Zaporowski.

The Blues returned to Omaha to meet their arch-city rival Omaha U. on the following Tuesday, April 20.

Pitching was the prime factor in this game. Creighton's Lou Kubat fashioned a six-hit pitching gem setting the Indians down with no hits for five innings.

A shaky first inning on the part of Omaha gave Creighton the winning run. Bob Lacy the Omaha pitcher gave a walk with three Bluejays on base to give the only run of the game. This was the Jays' only threat.

The Indians threatened three times but were checked each time by Kubat.

Jim Karabatsos the flashy shortstop collected half of the Jays' hits, getting three for four.

In the Jays' other home games May 1, Buena Vista of Storm Lake, Iowa downed Creighton 7-0.

Buena Vista took advantage of steady pitching and capitalized on Creighton errors to win.

Ralph Schriener, a crafty veteran, limited Creighton to a pair of hits. No

Bluejay runner advanced past second base.

Five of seven Creighton miscues led to Lou Kubat's downfall in a four-run sixth inning. Pitcher Dick Zaporowski of the Jays was also given shaky support.

Bill Fitzgerald had the only solid hit ball for Creighton, getting a double in the fourth inning.

Starter Lou Kubat was charged with the loss, giving him a 1-2 record for the year.

Coach Dick Ainslie's nine now has four games to pay. The Jays will meet Omaha University and Drake at home. Away the Jays play Morningside at Sioux City and Drake at Des Moines.

The home game with Omaha U will be played at Legion Park in Council Bluffs. The park is the home of the Omaha Cardinals of the Western League.

Jay Golfers Win 3, Lose 4

Led by Jim English, captain of the squad, the '48 version of the Bluejay golf team has been victorious in three matches while losing four.

English is the only Blue golfer not to be beaten so far this year and will be out to win the singles championship in the Missouri Valley meet. The Nebraska state amateur champ scored a three below-par 69 against Morningside for the best performance in any of the Jay meets.

The Blues shut out Midland college 27-0 in their first meet here April 10. Midland was never in the match as the Jays took control from the start to get the season off on solid footing.

In their next two meets with Bradley the Bluejays tasted defeat twice.

The Blues bounced back from the Bradley trip to trounce Morningside 12-6 at the Field Club April 23.

Moving into stiff Big Seven competition Creighton went down to Iowa State May 1, 11-7. The match was held at the Omaha Field Club.

The Blues have four meets left on their 1948 schedule including the Missouri Valley meet, one match with Morningside, and two with Omaha U.

The Jay squad has consisted of six men so far this year. Coach Bill Schuchart has been using Capt. Jim English, Bill Schmitz, Steve Parker, Jim McCormick, Tom O'Brien and Mike Healey.

All-Sports Banquet Honors Athletes . . .

The Creighton University Athletic Department will hold its second annual All-Sports Banquet at the Rome Hotel May 19.

Honored at the banquet will be one hundred and fifty Bluejay athletes. Letter winners will be named in basketball, baseball, tennis, golf, swimming, boxing. The basketball team will also elect its captain for the next season at the dinner.

Main speaker for the banquet will be Colonel Theodore Bank of the Athletic Institute in Chicago. Colonel Bank was in charge of procurement of all athletic equipment for the army during the war.

As president of the Athletic Institute, Col. Bank has broadened the objections and promotional activities of the non-profit organization to include not only the promotion of athletics but also physical education, health and recreation.

From 1939 to 1941 the now retired Army Colonel served as head coach, director of athletics and director of physical education at the University of Idaho. In addition he served as a professor of Physical Education.

Previously, in 1929, he joined the athletic staff at Tulane University as

assistant football coach and varsity baseball and boxing coach. He also taught there in the Physical Education Department.

Following overseas service in the first World War, he entered Michigan University where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1923. Later while on the coaching staff at Tulane he added his Master of Arts degree.

He started his coaching and teaching career at Patterson High School, Patterson, Louisiana in 1923 and two years later became superintendent of public schools at Patterson.

The first annual Creighton athletic award will also be given at the all-sports banquet.

The award will go to the most outstanding athlete participating in Jay sports the past year. The winner to receive a trophy will be decided by student balloting.

The *Creightonian* and the Creighton Athletic Department, will sponsor the award.

The dinner is open to the public and all friends and supporters of Creighton are invited. Price of tickets for the dinner is \$2.00 per person.

Tennis Team Wins 3, Loses 3 in Tough Matches

Creighton's tennis team holds a 3-3 record going into the final stretch of the 1948 spring sports schedule. The Jays hold wins over Midland, Morningside, and Omaha University. The Blues have lost two to Bradley and one match to Iowa State College.

The Blues opened the season in grand slam fashion trouncing Midland College 9-0, the Hilltoppers taking clean wins in all double and single matches.

Only Bill Clifford of the Jays was unable to win in straight sets. Clifford dropped his second game 4-6.

The tennis players then suffered the same fate as the golf and baseball teams by dropping two matches to Bradley University at Peoria.

The Blues bounced back to white-wash Morningside of Sioux City here April 23, 8-0. By taking the Sioux City match the Jays boosted its two-year win total to 27 consecutive individual matches on the home court.

The surprise of the match was Dave Hanighen's upset win over the Sioux City singles champion Len Foster. Hanighen who captains the Jay squad, last year went down before Foster twice.

A very potent Iowa State team was the next foe for the Jay tennis team.

Iowa State, one of the favorites for the Big Seven tennis crown downed the Jays 5-2 at Omaha on May 1.

The Bluejays next invaded the Omaha U. camp where they took the Indians to the tune of 6-1.

Only one Hilltopper failed to win his singles match. Jack McBride lost in the best two out of three.

Coach Duce Belford's lads have three more dates on the '48 schedule. The Missouri Valley meet headlines the remaining part of the Jay schedule. Also, the Blues have return engagements with Morningside and Omaha U.

Seven men have been seeing service for the Jays in their first six matches. The squad includes, Captain Dave Hanighen, Jerry Mullaney, Bill Clifford, Bill Scribner, Sol Kutler, Jack McBride and Bill Sak.

Injuries Hit Track Squad

Coach Frank Hagan's track team has run into stiff competition this year. The Jay squad to date has run in four meets.

Hagan has been depending very largely on his relay teams and his field event men to run up points so far this season.

The top man on the relay teams is little Jerry Riess. In addition to his relay work Riess is called on to perform in many of the dash events.

The Jay 440 and 880 yard relay teams have placed in all meets this year. The teams consist of Riess, Phil Franco, Bob Lacy and Dick Peters.

In the field events two men have performed very well for the Jays. Joe Ingersoll holds two first and two seconds in four meets thus far. Discus and shot-put man Forrest Cope has also racked up points for the Bluejays. Cope also throws the javelin. Another field

man who has done well is first year man Joe Greasso.

The Blues opened the season against Kearney there, April 13. The Jays went down before the Kearney men 145-19. Hagan was only able to take 10 men to the meet because of injuries and studies.

The Jays next entertained Midland and Peru here April 29. Peru walked away with honors here as the Jays landed in third place.

Coach Hagan also entered men in the Sioux City and Dakota Relays.

Hagan took eight men to Sioux City with Joe Ingersoll placing second in the discus and the 889 yard relay team placing third in that event.

At the Dakota Relays at Sioux Falls the Jays failed to place.

With the Missouri Valley meet coming up coach Hagan will have two more meets to get his lads ready. The Jays will entertain Morningside and Wayne in a triangular meet and will play host to Omaha U.

George Armstrong, CC 1, announcer for station KOWH, demonstrated radio newscasting and editing.

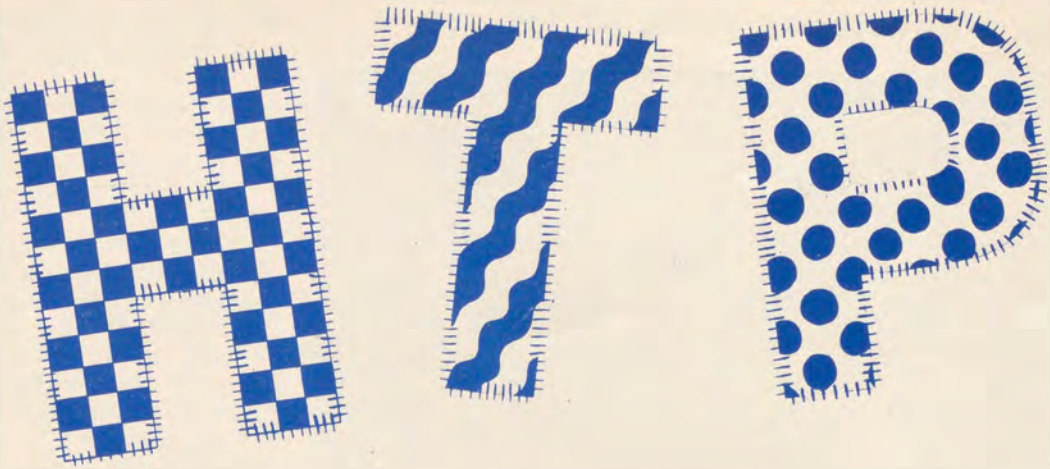
Marian Night held

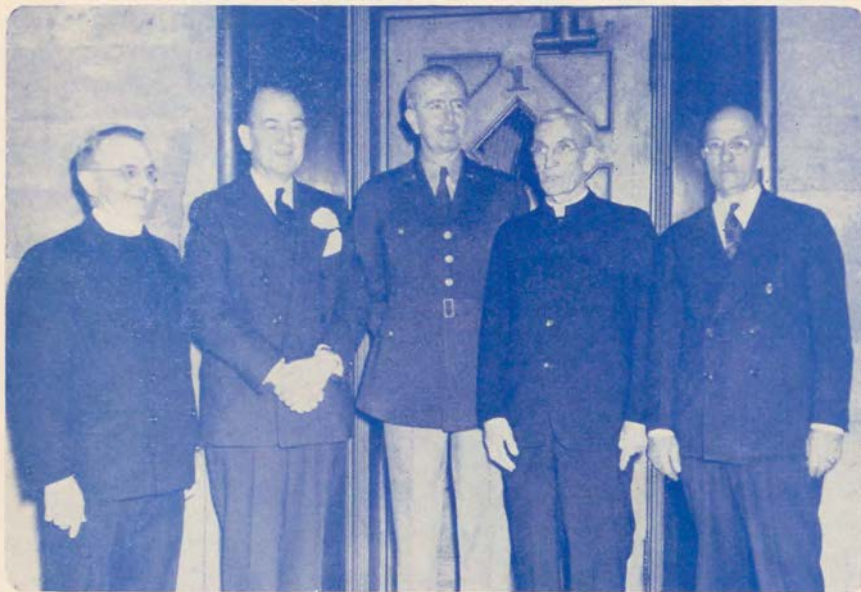

Bill Granberg, AB '47 Studies in Sweden . . .

Dear Mr. Kelly,

I have thought not once, but many times of Creighton in these months I have been in Sweden. I have had very scant, but much valued reports on the goings-on of the University. As my address is in the possession of a very few persons, I have only myself to hold responsible for my isolation from Omaha. Time has passed more swiftly than my mortal faculties could contend with, and I find I have not come near writing all of the letters I had hoped to write. There is hope yet that I may finish my correspondence. At least I have reached your name on my interminable list.

You will wonder, no doubt, what activities have kept me so busy here in Sweden that I have had so little time to write letters. When I arrived in Sweden after a short stay of about four days in London. I moved in with relatives in Hammerby, Southeast Stockholm. I contacted the University of Stockholm (Stockholms Hogskolan) and made out a course of Lectures and arrangements to take Swedish. The hard job was to find a place to live after I left my temporary lodgings with my relatives.

I met here at that time another Omahan. Allan P. Lewis, who is also attending the University here, although in the field of Economics and Sociology. He had an ample apartment, and I was able to stay there until I found a place in a suburb of Stockholm—Djursholm—where I live now. Although Djursholm is about 15 minutes by train (Elektrisk Tåg), it is friendly and being a wealthy settlement, there are many vilas and large private homes here. So that you will not wonder that I speak as private homes being rare. I will tell you that the overwhelming majority of the Stockholmites live in tall modern apartment houses of the type you have perhaps seen in books advertising the virtues of Sweden to the tourist. These apartment houses are really all over the place, and their modernity is striking contrast to the antiquity of Gamla Stan or the old part of Stockholm situated on the middle of the city upon an island.

There the streets are almost impassably narrow; there are the Kungliga Slottet, home of Gustav V, the Riksdag or buildings of Parliament, the House of Nobles, and many old churches (Storkyrkan & Riddarholmskyrkan being the main ones). The bank of Sweden is there too, and in the Royal backvard can be seen at noon the change of the guards. This spectacle is, like the one at Buckingham Palace, still regaled in the dull uniforms of war.

A second Semester (semester in the Swedish language means vacation, and the U. of Stockholm is known because of its many holidays as "the resort") has begun now, and I am hearing lectures in Swedish Literature and History, Goethe and Heine, the Eminent Victorians of Lytton Strachey, and a really surprising series called *Contemporary American Literature*. Then, of course, I have my studies in the Swedish language and an immense amount of reading to do for Seminars and other required readings. When I mentioned the many vacations we have, I did not infer their purpose, namely as periods to "fag" or go all out on reading.

Sweden itself, as you know, is being governed by the Social-Democrats and seems to be in the hands of their Finance Minister Vigfors. His name is the first one that an outlander in Sweden hears, and usually with appropriate epithets. The Swedish taxes are the highest in the world and as the 15th of February draws near the Swedes are only too aware of this fact of statistics. The new export and import regulations (beside monetary regulations to save wasted dollars) and the Russian trade pact are other causes against the regime in power. Nevertheless the Swedes hope for better times. Their very conservative nature politely foregoes anything beyond criticism of "gripes" in the way of removing "Vigfors."

In the realm of religion Sweden is like England, and it has a State Church of Luther and Olaus Petri's making. At present the Priest in Sweden has almost the sole duty of registry of vital statistics. On Sundays the churches are almost empty, and the majority of Swedes are frankly agnostic. The Catholic minority numbers around 5,000, but many of these are from the Legations and Embassies of Catholic countries. A person in a foreign country, at first unable to understand the sermons, finds a great sense of unity in the catholic latinity of the Church. Her altar, Her ceremonies, and Her Sacraments are home and make the soul at home in a foreign country.

This summer I hope to make my *grande tour* through the countries of Europe, in so far as I am able. If you are able to give me the addresses of other Creightonites in Europe, I would be very grateful to you. Time permitting, I hope you will write to me and bring me up to date on Creighton.
