CREIGHTON UNIVERSITY HAS JUST ENTERED into a management services agreement with American Express Special Teams that will bring the "one card" concept to campus. The "one card," in the form of a new, digitized campus identification card, will allow faculty, staff and students access to a wide variety of goods and services on campus that previously could only be obtained using cash or a check.

The new debit/identification card program, when fully implemented in the first quarter of 1997, will:

- Allow access to the Kiewit Physical Fitness Center, all residence halls, Law School, Medical School and Dental School, Bluejay athletic events, ATM's and other banking services nationwide.
- Enable you to buy books and supplies from Follett's Bookstore, One PC Plaza and the Joy Jay.
- Allow you to buy food and snacks from C-Jay's, Taco Bell, Godfather's, TCBY Yogurt, Blimpie's, Brandeis and Becker Dining Halls, the Convenience Store, Baker's and Albertson's, and other local merchants via the Interlink.
- Buy soft drinks and snacks from all Coca-Cola and Midwest vending machines on campus.
- Pay tuition, phone bills and meal plans at the Business Office.
- Pay parking fees and fines at Public Safety.
- Allow you to use laundry facilities in the residence halls, make copies at the libraries and vote in student elections.
