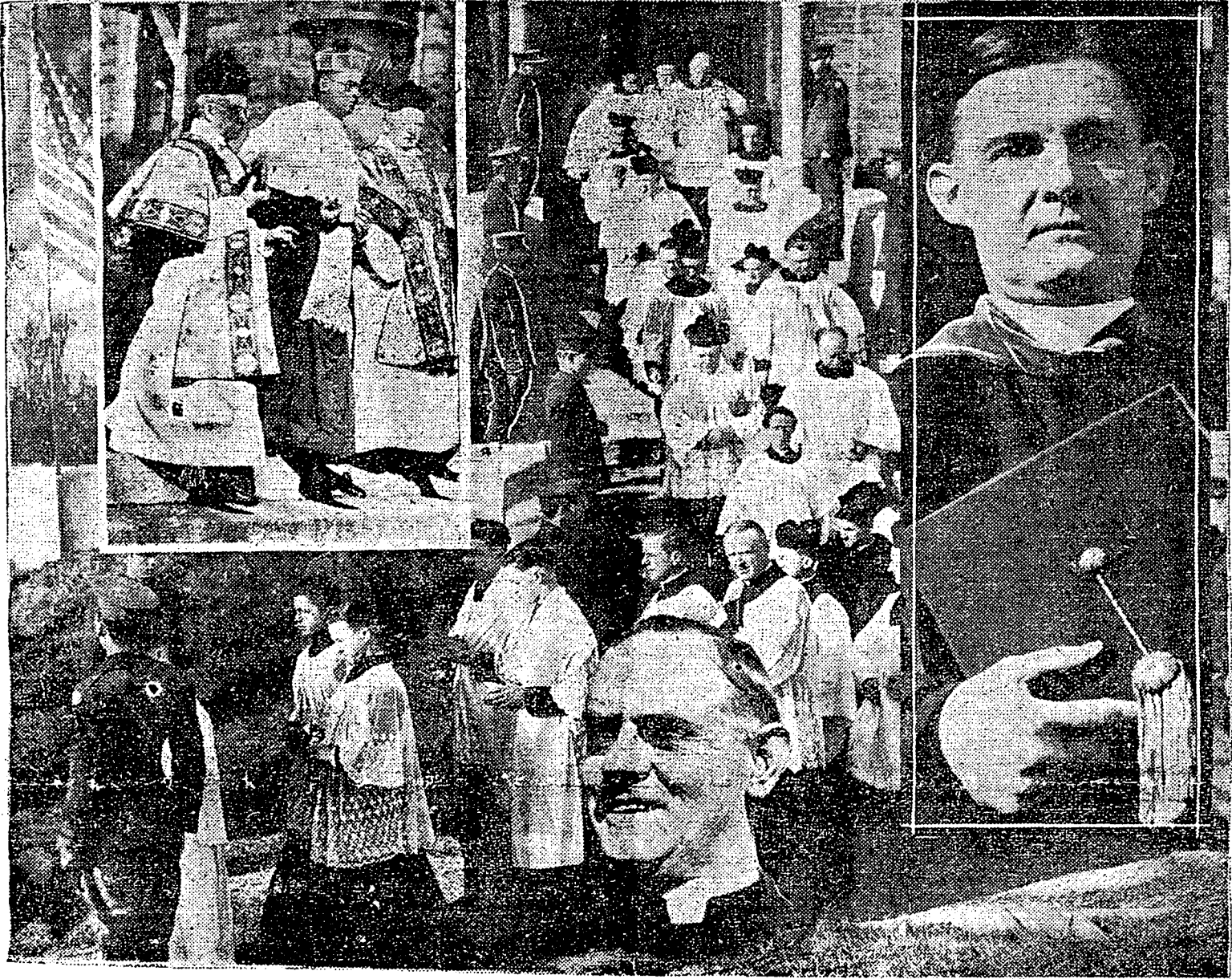

Scenes at The Inauguration of President Grace

In the upper left hand panel are left to right, the Rev. P. J. Judge, pastor of Sacred Heart church, the Rt. Rev. Francis J. Beckman, bishop of Lincoln, and the Rev. James E. Ahearne, pastor of St. Cecilia's cathedral, in the episcopal procession, on their way to St. John's church for the pontifical mass. Bishop Beckman was celebrant of the mass and Fathers Judge and Ahearne were deacons of honor to the bishop.

The large scene, forming the background of the layout, is a view of the episcopal procession, leaving the College of Arts and Sciences, and marching to the church between rows of cadets. The insert in the center of the layout is a likeness of the Rev. William F. Robison, S. J., St. Louis University, who delivered the sermon at the religious exercises. Inaugural Ceremonies Drew Many Notables

Three-Day Event Proves Most Elaborate Affair Ever Staged In City

Delegates from more than sixty universities and colleges, church dignitaries from various parts of the central west, and officials of the city and state, took part November 19 and 20 in the inaugural of the Rev. William Joseph Grace, S.J., as president of Creighton University.

The inaugural ceremony was conducted in three exercises, religious, civic and academic. On the day following the closing of the inaugural Creighton welcomed more than 1,000 Homecomers and in their presence dedicated the new \$275,000 concrete stadium.

The three-day ceremony brought

to Creighton's campus and halls, the largest and most representative gathering that the University has ever entertained.

On Thursday morning, November 19, pontifical mass, celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Francis J. Beckman, bishop of the diocese of Lincoln, Neb., opened the three-fold ceremony. The Rev. William F. Robison, formerly president of St. Louis University, in his sermon during the mass, remarked that Creighton University realizes the sacredness of its mission, realizes that its task is to build character and train souls, to make men, to teach youth to be true to themselves and thereby be true to God." Father Robison used as his text, Solomon's Prayer for Wisdom, Chapter IX, Book of Wisdom.

Thursday evening, more than 600 men and women, among them many distinguished guests, attended the civic exercises of the inaugural which centered about a banquet in Hotel

Fontenelle. The Honorable Adam McMullen, governor of Nebraska, was the principal speaker.

Friday morning, November 20, the inaugural closed with the academic exercises in Creighton gymnasium. The Rev. Albert C. Fox, S.J., president of Marquette University, called attention to the need of educated men and women in his address, "The Menace of Mediocrity."

The Rev. John F. McCormick, S.J., past president of Creighton, delivered the charge of office to President Grace and President Grace responded with his inaugural address.

"Better a small school that will produce comparatively few graduates, all of whom are equipped through our training to be leaders, than a huge machine to grind out multitudes of mediocre practitioners and business men", said Father Grace.

President Grace pronounced char-

How much do your brains weigh? This question has puzzled many people in the past, but Dr. Arthur McDonald of Washington, D. C., has worked out a system that solves the question without interior probings. He calculated the brains of a person by exterior measurements. A feature article in the Omaha Daily News of December 13, told about this new system, and the striking thing about it was the fact that three Creighton men were chosen among the twenty prominent men of Omaha, as representative of their profession.

Dr. Victor E. Levine, Creighton professor made the calculations, Walter Head, Omaha financier and Creighton Alumnus, was selected to represent Omaha men of finance.

"Mr. Head would have made a successful scientist had he not chosen the field of finance," says Dr. Levine when commenting on the statistics of the examination.

Paul Fitzgibbon, the flashy Bluejay halfback, was chosen as the most representative athlete in Omaha to give his head to science. If science could see the inside of Paul's head, he would probably find the cause for the quick thinking of Creighton's great backfield star.

It is worthy of note that of the twenty most prominent men of Omaha that three of them were affiliated with Creighton University.

C. U. Faculty And Students Donate \$1,337.40 To Chest

Faculty and students of Creighton donated through the University \$1,337.40 to the Community Chest, exclusive of pledges and donations made to the chest by students and faculty through other sources, according to a statement issued by Mrs. G. Mrs. McConnell added that those who gave \$1 or more to the chest would not be expected to give to the Red Cross.

CREIGHTON STUDENTS UNION INCORPORATED

The Creighton Students Union has been officially incorporated by Secretary of State Poole at Lincoln, according to announcement from his office this week.

The incorporation articles were published in The Creightonian last spring, and the move was initiated by the old Board of Governors.

The incorporation of the Union will allow it to carry on business relations in a regular way, and will permit further expansion and building development.

"Character means everything in the development of human beings", he said. "It decides whether a man will be a leader or lost in the crowd; whether he will use his knowledge and skill to exploit his neighbor or to practice the works of mercy; whether he will be a credit to the institution whose stamp of approval is on him, or an eternal disgrace and object of shame to the alma mater which nurtured him."

FR. EGAN DENOUNCES MEDICAL PRACTICES

Commerce And Law Regent Discusses Blazer Trial At Chapel Exercises

Instancing the vile absurdities which many doctors in Omaha and elsewhere have been voicing relative to the taking of life under some peculiar circumstances such as where one is suffering from a life infirmity or a uncurable disease. Father Thomas Egan, S. J., gave a stirring lecture in the Creighton University Sodality Chapel Sunday morning speaking on the great need of "True christian ethical standards." One of the largest crowds attending the Sodality exercises were present Sunday morning.

Father Egan charged that these false ethical standards were attributable to the lax teachings of the true ethical standards in the college and universities of the country which, he claimed, was in disregard for the natural law. The natural law, he said, was the will of the Creator.

"Is it not strange," he said, "that this doctrine which is according to reason and which we find recorded in the philosophies back as far as history reaches should be called in question today. The principles of the Natural Law which we find to be the creed of great thinkers—Plato, Aristotle, Marcus Aurelius, Kant, Blackstone and so many more eminent jurists is today cast aside for a new theory.

"To bolster up the principles of the Natural Law revelation is necessary and the disregard for this revealed word of God as given to man in the bible is undermining the principles of the natural law in the minds of men."

The sermon was provoked by the recent appearances in the Omaha papers of quotations from prominent doctors in which it concluded that a surgeon under certain conditions could take the life of an individual. Their statement were also in justification of Dr. Harold Elmer Blazer of Littleton, Colo., in taking of the life of his thirty-two year old imbecile daughter who has been proclaimed to be nothing more than a "husk". Father Egan charged this statement to be a calumny on the medical profession.

"Reason teaches us, the bible affirms, and the infallible Church promulgates the truth of the Natural Law and these modern savants refuse to follow them because they have invented an unproved theory which permits them to assume authority which God has reserved to Himself."

Fathers Schultz and Egan, who have charge of the weekly Sodality meetings, will deliver a series of sermons on lively topics which should tax the small chapel to capacity every Sunday morning.

SCOUTMASTER COURSE NEXT SEMESTER

HONORARY FRAT HOLDS MEETING

Members Of Alumni Chapter Co-Operate With Student Actives

In the spring of 1921 a chapter of Alpha Sigma Tau national honorary university fraternity was installed at Creighton University, the first chapter to be granted by the mother chapter at Marquette University, Milwaukee, Wis.

In 1923 the first ten graduates of Creighton from the ranks of Alpha Sigma Tau left the university. Since then each year ten more men have gone out and naturally some of them located in Omaha.

Last May a small group of the alumni met with the active chapter at their annual banquet and initiation of new members. The plan of an alumni chapter was broached openly.

Oscar T. Doerr, a graduate of the Law college last June, who is now a practicing attorney of Omaha, supported the plan and speaking as vice-president of the national chapter, Alpha Sigma Tau, sanctioned the move.

A week later a dozen alumni members and President W. J. Grace, who was the sponsor of the Creighton active chapter, since its organization, until his elevation to the presidency of the university, met as guests of Robert Burkley at the Omaha club and unanimously voted to petition a charter.

One other meeting was held before the warm summer weather made other meetings impractical.

On Tuesday, November 3, the alumni members held their first meeting of the fall. President Grace and Dean Joseph Flynn, of the Arts College, new active and alumni sponsor of the fraternity, were present.

President Grace was elected honorary president of the fraternity. Professor Charles Bongardt, of the Law College, was elected vice-president to fill a newly created office.

George Rogers, an attorney, with offices in the Keeline building, is chapter president. Robert Burkley, of the Burkley Printing company, is treasurer, Stephen A. Spitznagle, of the World-Herald editorial staff, is secretary.

Both active and alumni chapters of the fraternity have voted to attend the inaugural banquet tendered President Grace at the Fontenelle hotel on Thursday, November 19.

The alumni chapter is also making plans for sending a strong delegation to the national convention at the University of Detroit next February.

As Creighton has the second active chapter and the second alumni chapter granted charters, the alumni have gone on record as extending an invitation to the fraternity to hold its third annual convention in Omaha in 1927.

The first convention was held at Marquette last year. As most of the chapters are in the east, it was felt that this year's convention could better be held in Detroit.

C. U. Students Favor U. S. Entrance In Court

Poll Results In Plurality For Harding-Hughes-Coolidge Plan

Creighton University students favor the entrance of the United States into the World Court, and under the "Harding-Hughes-Coolidge Terms," as indicated by the tabulation of the vote conducted in the various classes of the University the past few days.

The Creightonian, the official student newspaper of Creighton, sponsored a poll on the proposition of the entrance of the U. S. into the court by one of the prominent plans now open for consideration. The student poll was taken in conjunction with over three hundred universities and colleges throughout the country in an effort to crystallize the student opinion regarding the league and the court.

The total vote cast at Creighton was 892, with 15 of the twenty-two classes reporting its vote. In some of the classes the vote was not taken in time to insure a report at the time of going to press. The tabulation of the entire vote showed that 412 favored the "Harding-Hughes-Coolidge" plan of entrance into the court, 75 favored the "Harmony" plan, 183 voted for the "Borah" plan, and 213 were against any participation in the court at this time.

A significant feature of the vote was the fact that in every class reporting the "Harding-Hughes-Coolidge" plan received the plurality of votes cast.

The resolutions of the "Harding-Hughes-Coolidge" plan which received the highest number of votes, are as follows:

First, that the admission of the United States to the court shall not be taken to involve any legal relation to the League of Nations or the assumption of any obligations under the covenant,—

Second, that the United States shall participate on terms of equality with other nations in the election of the judges by the council and assembly of the league,—

Third, that the United States shall pay a fair share of the expense of the court as determined and appropriated from time to time by the congress of the United States,—

Fourth, that the statute for the court shall not be amended without the consent of the United States,—

Fifth, that the United States shall not be bound by advisory opinions rendered by the court upon questions that the United States has not voluntarily submitted for its judgment.

He really came into form against Idaho in the final game of the year. His run of seventy yards for a touchdown was one of the most brilliant runs of the season. Keane would fit in well at halfback on any All-American team, and he should have his best year ahead of him as he still has another year of competition.
