Klutznick Symposium: The 12th Annual Klutznick Symposium will be held Oct. 9-11. This year's theme is "The End of Days?: Millennialism from the Hebrew Bible to the Present." Jerome F. Shapiro, Hiroshima University in Japan, will kick off the symposium on Saturday, Oct. 9, with a presentation on "Atomic Bomb Cinema: Judaism, the Apocalyptic Narrative Tradition and Western Culture and the Dawn of the New Millennium" at 8 p.m. in the Eppley Building, Walsh Lecture Hall. On Sunday, Oct. 10, at the Jewish Community Center (JCC) at 333 S. 132nd St., lectures will be held in three sessions--12:30 p.m., 2:10 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. Each session will feature two speakers. At 7:30 p.m., James Tabor from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte will keynote the symposium with his lecture "Apocalyptic Dreams and Schemes: How an Ancient Jewish Vision of the Future Came to Dominate the Modern World." Tabor is the co-author of *Why Waco?*--the important book that studies the controversial FBI attack on the Branch Davidian compound in Waco, Texas. Comedy Opens Fall Season at Creighton: The Department of Fine and Performing Arts will present "The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940," a comedy written by John Bishop, on the Main Stage of the Lied Education Center for the Arts Oct. 7-9 and Oct. 14-16 at 7:30 p.m. and Oct. 10 at 2 p.m. Ticket prices are \$8 for general admission, \$6 for senior citizens and \$5 for students, faculty and staff. Reservations may be made by calling the Reservation Line at x1448. "The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940" is a parody of the who-done-it murder-mystery films of the 1930s and 40s. Set in an old mansion, complete with secret passageways, sliding bookcases and a mysterious German maid, the story centers on a creative musical comedy team snowed-in during a financial backer's audition. This same team was responsible for a recent Broadway flop in which three chorus girls were murdered by the fiendish, still-at-large "Stage Door Slasher." Gradually the mystery is solved, but not before the plot takes the audience on a roller coaster ride of disappearances, disguises, unmaskings, twists, turns, unlikely heroes, slapstick and non-stop comedy. The New York Magazine said "'Murders' is the intelligent person's kind of nonsense."
