Father Reinert Cited

A B'nai B'rith citation, an honorary degree and an oil portrait symbolize the respect which the people around him have for the immediate past president of Creighton University, the Rev. Carl M. Reinert, S.J.

The B'nai B'rith Americanism Citation was presented to Father Reinert by Henry Monsky Lodge Number 354 on June 25. The award is presented annually to an Omahan "In recognition of outstanding service in community and civic affairs for the general advancement of Americanism and citizenship responsibility."

Earlier, on June 9, Father Reinert received an honorary Doctor of Laws Degree from the University of Nebraska with the citation ". . . Patiently, with compassion, with good humor, and always with integrity, he has helped to win increased respect and support from divergent sources for the University he serves . . ."

As was mentioned in the *Highlights* last month, a large oil portrait of Father Reinert was presented the former Creighton president by the University's Board of Regents at the close of the Commencement program.

In making the presentation George B. Boland, Chairman of the Board, summed up the feelings of the men who have served Creighton: "May I say to Father Reinert . . . that he has earned the respect and love of all who have known him and none have known him more intimately than the regents who were privileged to share in both the dreams and the fulfillment of these dreams . . . We would like to leave for posterity the image of Father Reinert as he appeared to thousands of alumni, businessmen and friends who admired him in his great hour of achievement.

Two "Firsts" Are Appointed
To the University Staff as

Three Named To Posts

THREE appointments have been announced by the Very Rev. H. W. Linn, S.J., President of Creighton University.

Dr. John J. Butkus is the first man to be named assistant dean of the School of Dentistry, Robert T. Reilly has been named to the newly-created post of director of special resources, and Harry A. Dolphin has become director of public relations for the University.

Dr. Butkus has been a full-time member of the School of Dentistry faculty since 1948 with the exception of two years spent on active duty in the military service.

He is a 1942 graduate of St. Joseph's High School in Omaha and a 1948 graduate of the Creighton School of Dentistry. He has been chairman of the Department of Crown and Bridge and director of the dental clinic.

In his new post Mr. Reilly will be an executive assistant to the Rev. Carl M. Reinert, S.J., President of the Creighton Development Foundation, and will be responsible for work with foundations, national corporations and federal agencies. He will be instrumental in Creighton's recently-announced 15-year, 45-million-dollar development program.

Mr. Reilly is a native of Lowell, Mass., and came to Creighton in 1950 from a position as production manager of a Boston, Mass., advertising agency.

He received a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Suffolk University, Boston; a master of arts from Boston University, and has completed most requirements for a Ph.D. at the latter school.

An active free lance writer, Mr. Reilly has published articles, poems, stories and essays in a number of different magazines. He has written two novels and a third will come out this fall. In addition, he has published a pocket biography of Bishop Galvin, a television series, several pageants, radio and television scripts. His radio series, written for the Omaha Junior League, earned the Freedom Foundation Award in 1955.

Mr. Dolphin, a member of the Creighton staff for 11 years, came as a journalism instructor after serving two and one-half years as state editor of the Muscatine (Ia.) Journal. A native of Dubuque, Ia., he was educated in the Maquoketa, Ia., public schools and earned a Bachelor of Science Degree from Creighton and a Master of Arts Degree from the State University of Iowa. He is engaged as a free-lance writer and photographer in addition to his work at Creighton.

Most Creighton Medics In General Practice

cine is tied for second place among the nation's medical schools for number of graduates in general practice.

With 87 per cent of its alumni applying the healing arts in general practice, Creighton ties with New York Medical College, according to the *Health Manpower Source Book* prepared by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare. These figures pertain to physicians graduated between 1925-1950.

Creighton's figure is 4 per cent above the average for privately owned medical schools. An average of 80 per cent of the physicians graduated from public schools go into private practice, the report shows.

The schools with the lowest proportions of graduates in private practice are Yale, University of Chicago, Johns Hopkins, Harvard, Rochester, Woman's and Utah.

Surveying all Creighton graduates up to mid-1959, the report indicates that 13.6 per cent of the University's medics were in hospital service such as internships, residency or other full-time staff positions; 9.6 per cent were in other medical practice such as full-time medical faculty, medical administration, research, public health, and industry; and a scant 2.7 per cent were not in medical practice.

The greatest number of certified specialists among graduates from all United States medical schools are, in order, internal medicine, surgery and obstetrics and gynecology, a trend followed by Creighton specialists. Specialists ranking low among Creighton medical alumni are aviation medicine, bacteriology, gastroenterology, obstetrics, gynecology (separately), and clinical pathology.

Approximately 22 per cent of the physicians in Nebraska are Creighton graduates, the Public Health report shows. Figures from the Creighton Alumni Office indicate that nearly half—45 per cent—of the Omaha physicians are Creighton alumni. Although Creighton medical graduates are found in all but two states (Delaware and South Carolina), they are found in greatest quantity in California, Iowa, Washington, Colorado, New York, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri and Oregon.

Millard Replaces Berry

Coach James L. Berry is leaving the Creighton campus after seven years as a star athlete and successful coach.

The personable young baseball coach and assistant basketball coach has been called to active duty as a second lieutenant in the Army Infantry. He will report to Fort Benning, Ga., No. 5.

Replacing him will be Herb Millard, who graduates this summer. Like Berry, Millard has been a star guard for the Creighton basketball team and also represented the Bluejays as a baseball player.

Millard, a graduate of Alleman High School, Rock Island, Ill., will work under John J. (Red) McManus, Creighton's head basketball coach and athletic director. He will be assistant varsity cage coach and be the head freshman coach. In addition, he will be Creighton's baseball coach.

Berry played four years as a varsity performer on both the basketball court and the baseball diamond. He was Creighton's leading scorer as a junior in the 1957-58 season. He ranked second in his sophomore and senior years. He was also Creighton's winningest pitcher during his four-year career.

As head freshman coach, Berry compiled records of 18-0, 18-3 and 9-9 during his three seasons with the basketball yearlings.

In two seasons as a varsity performer for the Creighton basketball team Millard scored 494 points. He ranked third in team scoring in the 1960-61 season and second during the past season.

Baseball Season is 10-8-1

Sporadic fielding and the absence of solid clutch hitting turned what might have been an outstanding season into a better than average year for the Creighton University baseball team.

The diamond squad closed Creighton's athletic year with a record of 10 wins, 8 losses and a tie.

Three players shared batting honors with the versatile Al Stolarskyj, pitcher and outfielder, registering the top average of .421 in 16 of the Jays' 19 games. Bill Dagerman hit a hefty .328 and led the team in hits (21), doubles (3) and stolen bases (8).

Mike Vergamini, the nifty infielder from Council Bluffs, had a .299 average and led the Jays in times at bat (67), runs (15), total bases (30) and runs batted in (13).

Stolarskyj also gained the crown as the most effective Bluejay pitcher. He pitched five complete games and had a 5-3 mark.

PATRICK E. BROOKHOUSER is a small-town boy who came to the city and made good in a big way.

He came to Creighton from Missouri Valley, Ia., (population 3,567), and graduated from the University June 6 with a perfect academic record for four years—4.00.

Termed as one of the most outstanding students to graduate from Creighton in its 84-year history, he has earned one of the top scholarships in the country. He will enroll at Johns Hopkins Medical School this fall on a full-tuition scholarship—the only one offered by that institution.

He was the first student from the College of Arts and Sciences to be elected president of the Creighton Student Board of Governors since the 1941-42 school year.

A multitude of activities, from playing the clarinet and singing folk songs to writing musical compositions, poetry and fiction make up the pastimes of this versatile scholar.

WHEN Dr. George Stavros received his medical degree from the Creighton University School of Medicine June 6 he was probably thinking of a little toy cash register in his father's shoe repair shop.

Emanuel Stavros placed the miniature cash register in his Estherville, Ia., shoe shop when his son, George, was just a child. From then on, all shoeshining receipts received by either went into the little cash drawer.

To augment the cash register's receipts, George worked part time most of his college years. He entered Creighton on a competitive scholarship, then was a life-guard at the Creighton swimming pool. He performed odd jobs for the Jesuits, worked in the cafeteria and one summer received a grant from the Nebraska Heart Association for research in hypertension. Another summer he worked at Mercy Hospital in Council Bluffs.

Last year George married the former Teresa Armstrong of Lewis, Ia., and they lived in Council Bluffs the past year.

Since graduation Dr. Stavros has entered the Air Force and is interning at Lackland Air Force Base, Tex.

As for Mr. Stavros, who settled in Estherville in 1916 and opened his shop in 1920: "I want to spend some time visiting my children and fishing."

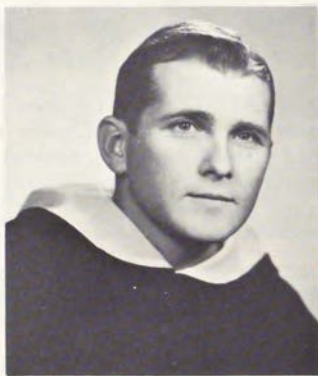

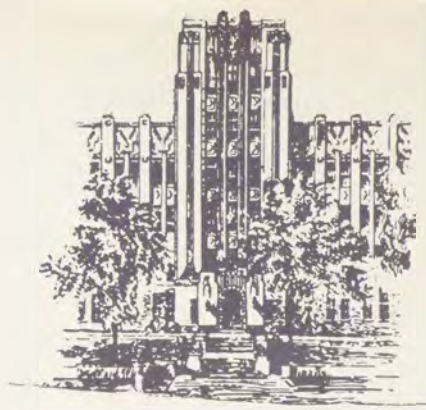
