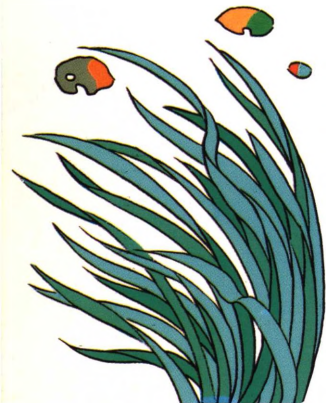
THE NORTH WIND AND THE SUN
