You ought to have more confidence in yourself than you have in any one else. You're the fellow you've got to fall back on when a pinch comes. Be ready for it, and it never comes.

Think well of yourself and make your store deserve the business, and the other fellow will never worry you. You'll get your share if you go after it.—The Pittsburg Druggist.

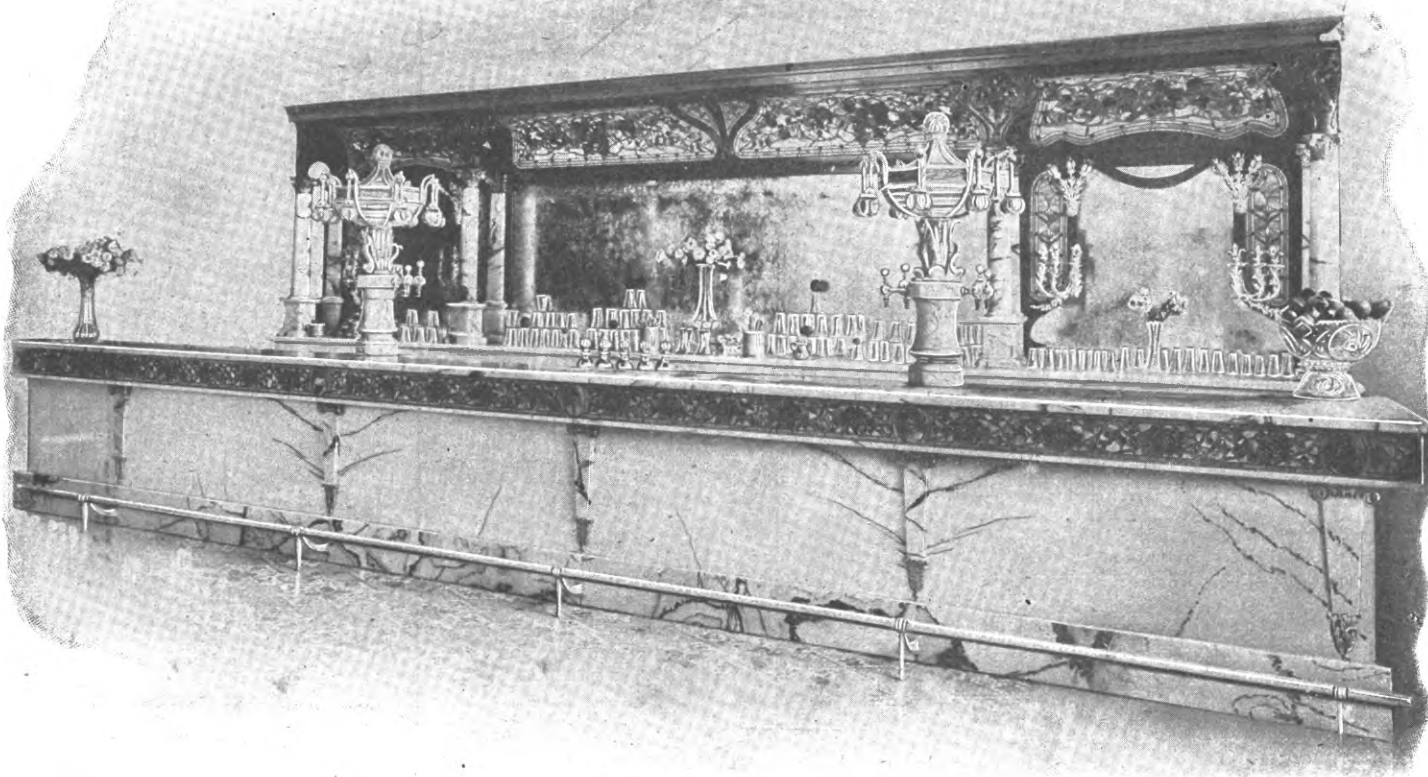

the highest legal tribunal for final adjudication two issues of far-reaching consequence to the drug and allied trades: First, as to whether the so-called contract and serial numbering plan for the protection of prices is legal when employed by an individual manufacturer; and, second, as to whether a manufacturer who employs this plan can maintain an action for damages against a jobber or other dealer who obtains his goods indirectly and, after defacing wrappers, labels, cartons, etc., so as to obliterate retail price marks, places them on the market at cut rates. The petitioner in this case is the Dr. Miles Medical Company and the respondent is the John D. Park & Sons Company, the proceeding being an appeal from a decision of the Circuit Court of Appeals of the Sixth Circuit adverse to the petitioner.

Both the questions involved in this interesting case have been the subject of decisions in the courts below, but the rulings have been diverse in different jurisdictions, and the United States Supreme Court has never had presented to it

Legality of Contract Plan to be Adjusted in U. S. Supreme Court.

On Oct. 19 the United States Supreme Court granted a petition for a writ of certiorari, according to the "Oil, Paint and Drug Reporter," in a case that will bring before

exactly the issues involved herein. In the now famous case against the so-called drug trust the contract and serial numbering plan was assailed as a violation of the Sherman anti-trust law when employed by associations of manufacturers and dealers, but the use of the plan by an individual manufacturer was not condemned, the inference being rather that such use was legal. In other actions brought in the lower courts manufacturers have been sustained in their efforts to maintain the advertised retail prices of their products, but in certain copyright cases the United States Supreme Court has refused to award damages against price-cutters, although in these cases contracts were lacking and no such system of identification as the serial numbering plan was involved. Under these conditions the action brought by the Dr. Miles Medical Company will serve as a test case, and the outcome will therefore be awaited with great interest not only in the drug trade but throughout the business community.—Merck's Report.

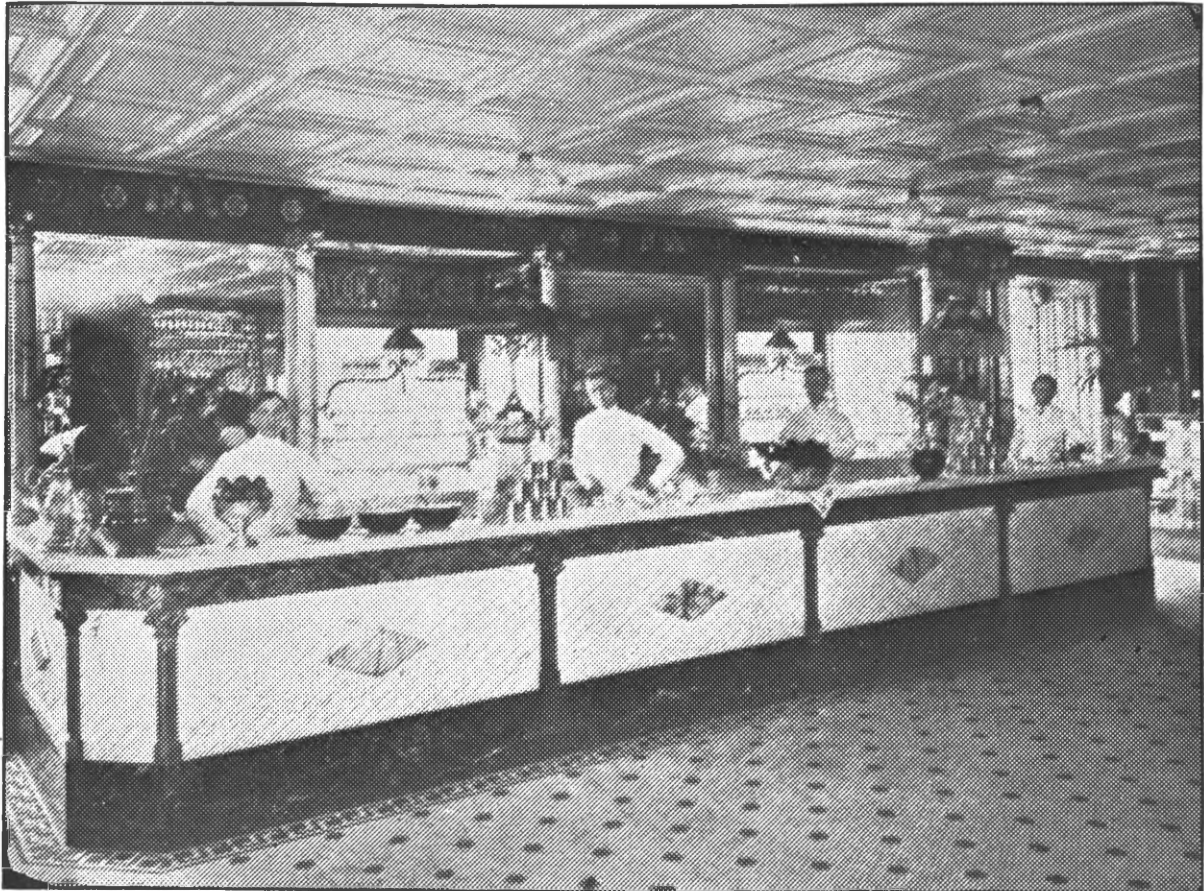

THE CARE OF THE SHOW WINDOW.

Today, as the great field of competition becomes more severely pressed for better results, it behooves us as pharmacists to look to the best that is within us.

Aside from our executive ability as managers of the clerical side, it rests also with us to find other means of advancing our business and acquiring more profits. At this stage, we are led to the field of advertising.

The cheapest and best method for us to consider is that of the window display. I have found from a few years of experience that window advertising pays, and pays big. Let us consider some of the best methods to pursue along this line. First of all, of course, concerns our window itself. We must have windows suitable for displays. About the best size of windows for ordinary trims in the drug business would be 10 feet long and about 5 or 6 feet deep. For myself I prefer a plate glass front devoid of all lettering for this reason: At different seasons of the year we are able (provided we are fair brush artists) to paint signs of our own makeup upon the glass in whiting and mucilage of acacia, that will pay us in dollars and cents far greater than the old customary signs: "Jones' Drug Store," etc.

Now we come to the matter of the dressing, and first of all, is the great need of cleanliness. The window must be absolutely clean. That is emphatic!

Second, the formation of our background. In the question of the background we find an all-important need. The background is to the show window what the frame is to the picture. There are many kinds and we must use our own judgement in the selection to correspond with our trim outline. Scenic backgrounds are popular. Among others I would suggest the arch with side standards formed by crossing of tape, forming a lattice work; backgrounds formed by securely fastening barrel hoops together and covering; pillars with cross bars, either straight or curved piece at the top; lattice work across the upper part of background frame with light wood fence at the bottom made of 1-inch by $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch or $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch stuff; backgrounds made solely of drapings with bunting; those formed by plants, palms, etc; backgrounds formed from twine representing spider web, inserting the artificial spider made from tissue paper and wire; solid plain colored background with a large hole 3 feet in diameter cut in the center, edged with appropriate colors, depending on the season, either evergreen for winter trims, branches of apple blossoms, etc., for summer and fall trims; shelf work of various kinds. These are a few of the many that may be used.

Here are some good rules to follow in making displays: Never keep the same articles displayed in the same manner in the same window exceeding one week.

Concentration is the main thing to keep in mind in exploiting any special sale.

Lead the observer to realize at a glance the point you are driving at in the display by this concentration of your arrangement.

Never overcrowd your windows with a conglomeration of articles.

If you are displaying some special article, sometimes the quantity may be used to bring out the fact that you buy in large quantity in order to accommodate the sales. This often proves good.

Your color scheme must harmonize. Don't run colors together that set the nerves afire. Ofttimes I have seen color combinations that ruined the entire displays.

Another point always to be remembered in your window displays is the fact that the price tag is the all-powerful silent salesman of your trim. Keep this always in mind, for it will pay you big. Price and quality well displayed make sales that raise the trimmer's salary.

Always exercise care in the lighting of your windows. Avoid reflections and shadows. The best light and effect are produced when the light may be placed at the edge of the glass and thrown into the display. Above all things work with a set purpose in mind and be careful, thoughtful and diligent.—The New Idea.

The Financing of a Drug Store.

Read before the Massachusetts Pharmaceutical Association by E. O. ENGSTROM, Pittsfield, Mass.

After deciding how to fit up the store in stock and fixtures and deciding what side lines to push, it is wise to keep a constant watch on the expense account; good judgment must be exercised, as a man can make a mistake in cramping his business by too small expenses and he may fail if they are too large. If he does not pay enough for his clerk hire or advertising he will turn business away which would naturally come to his store. On a percentage basis the cost has been in my experience of 12 years as owner of a drug store:

Clerk hire, which included my salary.....	14 per cent.
Rent.....	4 per cent.
Light, taxes, insurance, freight, advertising....	4 per cent.
Int. on capital invested and depreciation.....	3 per cent.

Total.....25 per cent.

This, I think, is a fair division. I have had my total expense as high as 26 per cent, and as low as 23.5 per cent. I have always found when my expenses have been high I have been lazy and not done as much work in the store as I should. That is, I have not taken in \$750 to \$800 a month personally over the counter, and as I have drawn \$25 a week salary I should have averaged \$25 a day in sales. I have men working for me now, and I have found the last year that my highest paid clerks must take in more daily than their weekly salary to make up for the cheap help which do not wait on customers. Still I am careful not to allow my total weekly payroll to exceed the average daily sales.

Rent is figured in proportion to the location, which means the number of people naturally coming to the store for their needs. If your rent costs you more than 5 per cent. you are laboring under a disadvantage as compared with your competitors. The other expenses I mention may be higher than yours and in such a case you may be allowed to transfer the saving in the two last items of expense to the first two, but to be successful you must keep down the expense of doing business to 25 per cent.

The successful druggist can figure on an income from his store, if he owns it himself and conducts it in a business way, of 8 1-3 per cent net profit on his yearly business, if we consider the average gross profit at 33 1-3 per cent.

Then the last interest on this will give him 1 2-3 per cent. equals 10 per cent. net from his business plus what he earns himself as clerking in the store, which is a weekly wage equal to his average daily sales.

I believe a successful man always looks on his business as a concern where he is acting manager should see to it that he gives value received and never takes away as salary any more than he is justly entitled to. He should never hire one or two clerks at \$10 or \$15 per week to do the only work done in the store, himself smoking good cigars and talking to friends about the hardships of the drug business. Expecting to gain a living by investing a couple of thousand dollars in a drug store and feeling bad because he can not draw the full amount of his capital as dividend each without labor, is absurd.

When I hear of three men investing \$500 apiece to start in a drug business, each man expecting to make a living out of the profits from what possible business they may do, I feel sorry for them. All the business they can do is twice as much a year as their store is worth, and unless they have credit enough to control a store worth \$5,000 or \$6,000 they will soon see their error.

The same applies to a young man leasing a store at \$1,000 a year rent. If he succeeds he should do \$20,000 a year business, requiring a store worth about \$10,000. And unless he has the money, or can get credit for the biggest part of this sum, he is building on a foundation which at the first financial storm may fall.

I am not trying to discourage the starting of drug stores in the future, but I believe the business has come down to a strictly business proposition, which is that the gross profits in our business cannot exceed 35 per cent. so the net income of 10 per cent. is all that anyone can expect and a man cannot make clerk wages in too small a store.

To be successful let us look upon our calling as a business which requires a professional knowledge applied secundum artem to such transactions as need it. Always remember the fundamental part of business profit and expense.

Love your business, so you may easily acquire the intelligent skill and energy to make it a success.

Honesty, integrity, force and square dealing with the public, together with a broader view of life, will place a pharmacist as a good business man on a higher plane in the estimation of his fellow men than any real or imaginary title of profession or doctor without those qualities can do.

The Drug Clerk Defined.

The drug clerk at the present is a compound tincture of variable quality and ordinary strength. He is not recognized as a standard pharmaceutical preparation until he becomes a registered pharmacist. His therapeutic value is determined, first, by his employer; second, by the trade or general public whom he serves. Since he is a compound tincture, he is composed of various attributes, such as honesty, integrity, intelligence, ambition and ability. He is held in solution, *i. e.*, to his work by his salary; and is warranted to degenerate in any climate. Dose by the month, from \$40 to \$75; dose by year, from \$900 to \$1,200. If the faculties of his mind are chemically well-balanced, he will not be easily precipitated by the acid of a difficult and exacting trade. In character he is tonic, non-irritant; without acid reaction; unrestricted in utility and of uniform sustained action. He invites your critical analysis.—B. C. Heliman in the Annual Report of the St. Louis Drug Clerks' Society.

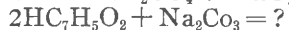
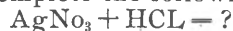

Liq. Plumbi Subacet..... ½ oz.
Tr. Opii 2 drs.
Aquaë..... q. s. 4 ozs.

There is certainly not a drug-clerk who has not at some time or another dispensed this prescription. Though strictly incompatible, it is nevertheless dispensed daily; and as it seems to give good results to both physician and patient, we must not object. The incompatibility is a double one: lead subacetate being an alkaloidal precipitant, precipitates the alkaloids of the opium; another portion of it combines with the meconic acid present in the opium tincture and precipitates as lead meconate. In the case where lead acetate is used instead of the subacetate (as it is in the National Formulary—see "Lotio Plumbi et Opii), the precipitate is not quite so heavy.

Hydrarg. Chlor. Mitis..... 3 grs.
Ammon. Carbon..... 5 grs.
Sacch. Lactis..... 5 grs.

M. et. ft. pulv. No. 1 Tal. dos. No. xxiv.

There is no positive proof on hand that a very poisonous compound is formed on mixing the above ingredients; nevertheless it is better to be on the safe side, and not dispense this prescription. When the ammonium carbonate and calomel are rubbed together the color of the powder is changed to black. This black color is due to the formation of mercurous oxide (Hg₂O) and ammonium mercurous chloride (NH₂Hg₂Cl); and, taking into consideration the instability of the mercurous compounds, there can hardly be any doubt that within a short time a portion of them will lose the extra atom of metallic mercury and pass into the mercuric state.

Sol. Labarraque..... 75.0
Sol. Hydrogenii Peroxidi.. 75.0

S.: Apply to nose and throat with cotton swab.

The activity of Labarraque solution, or solution of chlorinated soda, depends upon the presence therein of sodium hypochlorite, which is easily decomposed, yielding chlorine. In the presence of the peroxide the hypochlorite becomes reduced, according to the following equation: NaClO + H₂O₂ = NaCl + H₂O + O₂.

As is seen, the peroxide becomes reduced to water at the same time.

Kali Hypermangan..... 0.5
Argenti Nitratiss..... 1.5
Aquaë Destillatæ..... 25.0

Of course, the permanganate dissolves readily in water and so does the silver nitrate; but on mixing the two solutions a precipitate of silver permanganate will form, the latter being soluble only in about 15 parts of water, according to my investigations. Of course, the silver permanganate will not remain long as such, it being soon decomposed into silver oxide, metallic silver, potassium man-

ganate and manganese dioxide (or manganese hydroxide)
Sod. Salicyl..... 5 drs.
Sod. Bicarbon 3 drs
Aquaë Ment. Pip..... 3 ozs.

The patient should be told that the medicine will darken after a while, so that there will be no cause for alarm. A solution of commercial sodium salicylate always gets somewhat brownish, and especially does the color develop in an alkali.

Magnes. Sulph..... 2½ ozs.
Spts. Ment. Pip..... 1½ ozs.
Aquaë 3 ozs.
S.: Two teaspoonsful every 4 hours.

There is just about enough water in this prescription to dissolve the magnesium sulphate. It will be a fully saturated solution. But on adding the spirit of peppermint, the entire mixture becomes, so to say, solid, the magnesium sulphate being thrown out of solution. Does any chemical reaction take place? None at all. It is a purely physical process. The MgSO₄ is insoluble in alcohol; the latter, besides, possesses strong hygroscopic properties, and abstracts the water from the salt. This salt, having no solvent in which to keep dissolved, precipitates out.—W. J. Robinson, in the Critic and Guide.

Method of Attracting Trade.

Till they're all too fine for use!"

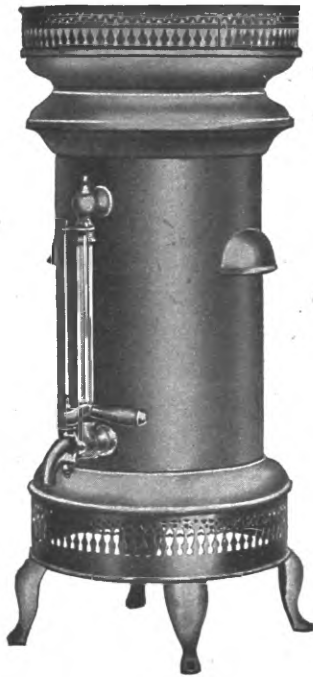
A drug store window recently contained a number of cut glass bottles. Upon each was a tag announcing a "drive" price. There were groups of each style and upon the top of the bottles were laid sheets of glass for shelf purposes. On each of these shelves stood a half pound bottle of handkerchief extract. Leaning against the bottle was a card stating "You may have either of the bottles that you see below, filled with this perfume for — additional." The display was the means of selling many fancy bottles filled with perfumery.—Practical Druggist.

The Coco-Cola company has won its suit in the United States Circuit Court against Max Jacobs and the Western Bottling Works, and the court has issued a decree that forbids the defendants to make or sell or advertise that they have for sale, either in bottle or by the glass, any beverage, as "Kos-Kola," "Cold-Cola" or by any other name so similar in sound or appearance as to lead customers to believe that they are buying the drink known as Coca-Cola. This decree also forbids them infringing on the trade name "Coca-Cola," or trying to sell any other drink in place of Coca-Cola and thereby deceiving the public.

The court has made this decree perpetual and final.
