UNIVERSITY NEWS HIGHLIGHTS

Fr. McCabe Announces Development Program

Commencement day for Creighton's 156 seniors also marked the first announcement of Creighton University's Development Program.

On that day, Creighton's president, the Very Rev. William H. McCabe, S.J., told graduates and faculty of the start of a long-range program to meet the University's financial needs.

In his traditional president's report, Father McCabe compared the Hilltop of 1911—his own student days—with the Creighton of today. He pointed out that the University has grown from a unit of five schools to the great institution it is today, with 2,750 students and 10 schools and colleges.

He indicated that such expansion has put a tremendous strain on the University.

The endowments which the Creighton family so generously bestowed on us so many years ago are no longer sufficient," said Father McCabe.

He explained that operating costs have risen, and declared that the buildings which now house the university are inadequate.

According to Father McCabe, the long range plan is designed to meet Creighton's needs in endowment, buildings and operating costs.

As executive secretary to the president of Creighton, one of Father Henry W. Linn's duties will be to act as director of the development program.

"It is our conviction," said Father McCabe, "that our alumni and the general public are vitally interested in Creighton, and in what she is doing."

He pointed out that the alumni will play an important and vital part in the coming campaign, which will be conducted in its first phase as a reorganized, personalized and intensified Loyalty Fund campaign.

Beginning with the Omaha area, steps have already been taken to organize alumni according to schools. As the months progress, the program will be expanded to groups of loyal alumni throughout the country. The whole alumni campaign will be conducted on a personal contact basis. Teams of former students have been organized

along military lines, with leaders working directly with the director of the program and with their team members.

All contributions will be ear-marked as the donor wishes. Alumni may specify a particular school, or give to the general university fund. They may also designate whether the money is to be used for endowment, building or general fund.

A building and endowment trust fund has been established for the Schools of Medicine, Law and Dentistry, through the co-operative efforts of the University and alumni.

Father Crimmins New Medical Regent

The Hilltop can now boast of three university ex-presidents on its staff.

The Rev. Herbert C. Noonan, former head of Marquette University, has been at Creighton for many years as head of the department of philosophy.

The Very Rev. William H. McCabe, S.J., Creighton's present president, served in a similar position at Rockhurst College for nearly six years before coming to the Hilltop.

Third member of the trio is a new addition to the staff. He is the Rev.

Harry B. Crimmins, S.J., former president of St. Louis University. Father Crimmins has been appointed to the position of regent of the School of Medicine and the College of Pharmacy, succeeding the Rev. J. J. McNerny, S.J., who has held the posts for 15 years, in addition to the regency of the Schools of Dentistry and Nursing.

Father Crimmins was recently discharged from chaplain's service with the Army. He served in the African, Sicilian and Italian campaigns with the 70th General Hospital unit from St. Louis University, and was overseas two and one-half years.

While stationed in Italy, Father Crimmins gave the last rights to German general Anton Dostler, first enemy leader to be executed as a war criminal.

The new regent was ordained in 1926, and taught at Rockhurst College, St. Mary's College, and St. Louis University. He was director of graduate studies at St. Louis before assuming the presidency in 1936. He served as chief executive until his entrance into service in 1942.

Fr. Hubbard Reports

No train, no plane, no bus—the Rev. Bernard R. Hubbard, S.J., famed "Glacier Priest," nearly needed a team of his renowned huskies to get him to Omaha in time for a scheduled lecture appearance in Creighton's auditorium.

However, his luck held out, and he arrived safely.

Father Hubbard gave two performances for the school kids of Omaha, and then packed the auditorium the night of May 24, when he showed colored movies of his recent mission to Europe.

Father Hubbard was commissioned by American provincials of the Society of Jesus to make a survey of Jesuit houses in war-torn Europe.

The Alaskan scientist and explorer renewed acquaintance here with Dr. Victor E. Levine, professor of biochemistry at the Medical School. Dr. Levine and Father Hubbard were together on several Alaskan expeditions, where the Creighton faculty member was conducting his famous research on nutrition among the Eskimos.

Summer Enrollment Triples Normal at 1,325

Registration for Creighton's Summer Session this year topped all previous records when 1,325 students swarmed through the doors on June 10. This is just about three times the normal enrollment.

The Rev. Henry W. Linn, S.J., director of the Summer Session, says that about 80 percent of the regularly enrolled students continued their work during summer school. The customary teacher-enrollment was also increased this year, so the Hilltop is overflowing with students.

The coming of the usual complement of nuns into the two residence halls complicated the student housing situation somewhat, but the Veterans Service, under the direction of Kenneth H. Thompson, struggled with the problem successfully.

Summer School students will be able to earn a maximum of nine hours during the session.

In addition to the regular courses offered during the school year, special institutes for teachers will also be held.

In the institutes, teachers will be brought up to date on the latest tricks in their profession. Institutes will be held in the fields of education, English, radio, and vocational guidance.

Authorities from other schools are being brought to the Hilltop for each institute, so that the university's summer session students will have the benefit of their "know-how," Father Linn said.

Seven new courses have been added to the curriculum this year. They are: kindergarten and primary education, elementary and high school English, guidance in adolescent problems, radio education, elementary school teaching, engineering drawing, and school finance.

For the first time, summer session courses in journalism will be available. One course will be offered for journalism teachers.

Three Jesuits from St. Mary's, Kans., will be guest instructors for the summer session. They include the Rev. Thomas C. Donahue, S.J., the Rev. Richard McGloin, S.J., and the Rev. Gerald Kelly, S.J.

Advanced ROTC

Creighton's ROTC unit will be booming its way back to pre-war normal, according to Col. Robert R. Martin, PMS&T on the Hilltop.

Col. Martin has received word that Creighton has been allotted a quota of 29 men for the advanced course which will be started in the fall.

For the past three years, the Hilltop cadets have been operating without a first or second advanced class.

Col. Martin, who arrived on the Hill just a few weeks ago, put his cadets through their paces in the annual Federal inspection on May 6. The ROTC unit is gunning for its 12th "Excellent" rating in twelve years. Colonel Luke D. Zeck, director of the school division for the Seventh Service Command, headed the inspecting party.

Fr. Motherway on Staff

Personal Affairs Consultant for veterans at Creighton University.

That's the new title borne by the Rev. Aloysius T. Motherway, S.J., former English instructor in Creighton Prep. Father Motherway just com-

pleted two years as an army chaplain.

He entered the service in 1944, and, after attending chaplain's school at Fort Devens, Mass., he was assigned to Harmon General Hospital, in Texas.

Later posts included Camp Hood, where he was the only priest for more than 50,000 men, and Camp Fannin, Texas.

Father Motherway received his release from the service in April. In addition to his duties as veterans' personal adviser, he will become a member of the English department for the summer session.

Nurses Enroll in June

The first all-civilian classes in St. Catherine and St. Joseph's Hospital nursing units since 1942 began their studies in June.

Applications for enrollment at both schools are being accepted at the present time. High school graduates who wish to enter the nursing profession should address either Sister Mary Kevin, OSM, director of the nursing school at St. Catherine's, or Sister Mary Crescentia, OSF, director of St. Joseph's nursing school.

"Looking Forward"

The following paragraphs are excerpts from "Looking Forward," a message from the Very Rev. William H. McCabe, S.J., Creighton's president, to all alumni. The editor of the *Alumnus* feels that the ideas expressed here are worthy of particular attention from every former student of Creighton.

The University has outgrown seriously her endowment. All educational administrators know that only a fraction of the operating cost of education is paid by student tuition and fees. The rest must, in tax-supported universities, come from the tax-payers' pockets. In gift-supported universities, it must come from gifts for endowment. The same holds for new buildings; the gift-supported school must depend on generous gifts for these. The Creighton University has serious need of gifts for endowment and buildings today.

Acutely conscious of these needs, Creighton yet feels that in seeking gifts for her work she is not presenting herself as an object of charity.

Creighton University feels that the general public will see, as the Creighton benefactors saw, the value of an investment in education . . . An investment at Creighton means returns in leaders trained to think straight and act constructively, in business and the professions.

156 Graduates In June Exercises

One hundred fifty-six seniors in Creighton University's undergraduate schools received their degrees on June 3 at the close of the Hilltop's 68th year.

No degrees were awarded by professional schools at this time because of the previous war-time accelerated schedule. Dental and Medical students received their sheepskins last March, while the School of Law plans a graduation in August.

Commencement week activities opened on June 1, with the traditional Senior-Alumni banquet at Hotel Fontenelle. At this time, the June graduates were received into the Alumni Association by Raymond J. Kane, president of the Alumni Council.

Principal speaker for the evening was Ephraim L. Marks, LLB '32, who was recently released from active duty with the rank of colonel. Toastmaster was Byron W. Reed, BSC '29. William W. Jurgensen, junior in the school of Medicine, made the response for the seniors.

On June 2, the Rev. Alvin Kutchera, Catholic chaplain at the University of Wisconsin, gave the baccalaureate address in St. John's Church. The Rev. Charles K. Hayden, S.J., dean of men, blessed the American flag, gift of the senior class, which will fly from the University staff next year.

Degrees were conferred upon the graduates at 10:00 A.M., June 3, in the gymnasium. The commencement address was delivered by the Rev. Raphael C. McCarthy, S.J. Father McCarthy was formerly president of Marquette University, and is now regent of the school of nursing and director of the department of psychology at St. Louis University.

Varsity Golf Team

Creighton's first intercollegiate golf team in a number of years did right well for itself in the Missouri Valley tournament at Wichita on May 10.

The Jay varsity, composed of freshmen Jim English, Dale Lee, Al Kelly and sophomore Irving Ziegman teamed up to post a 54-hole total of 1033 in

the Valley match. Their combined average was good enough for them to cop the number two spot in the conference rankings.

Jim English took third place in the race for medalist honors with a 244.

Genial "Duce" Belford's boys warmed up for the loop competition by administering two sound beatings to the University of Omaha, and giving another lesson to Morningside College.

'46-'47 Cage Schedule

Basketball coach Eddie Hickey is making good use of his Navy-enforced absence to line up a tip-top schedule for next year's fighting Bluejay basketballers.

The Missouri Valley card is already formulated, and Coach Hickey is working hard on the non-conference games.

First conference game for the Jays has been set for January 10, when they tangle with Wichita University on the Hilltop court.

The Jays will play a round robin, home and home fray with each of the other loop members.

Marian Night

A crowd of nearly 2,000 took part in the celebration of Creighton's annual Marian Night festivities on May 12.

Students from the Hilltop schools and all of Omaha's high schools were represented in the candlelight procession from the front of the Administration Building to the grotto of the Blessed Virgin, and thence to the stadium.

After recitation of the Rosary, and dedication of the ceremony to Mary, Queen of Peace, the Very Rev. William H. McCabe, S.J., president of Creighton, celebrated solemn benediction at the outdoor altar set up in the middle of the stadium. He was assisted by the Rev. Ernest G. Graham of Cathedral, and the Rev. Edward A. Allen of St. Columban's.

Medal Awarded

After a four-year absence from the Hilltop campus, the annual McShane Oratorical contest was revived this year on May 2.

This year's competition marked the first time that the founder of the contest, Thomas J. McShane, AB '99, has been present. Mr. McShane annually presents the winner with a gold medal.

Subject for the contest was "Youth in the Atomic Age." In a hard-reached decision, Frank Mazza, sophomore in Creighton College, was named the winner.

Judges for the contest were three graduates of Creighton's Law School and leading legal lights of Omaha Post No. 1 of the American Legion. They were Dan Gross, LLB '16, Thomas C. Quinlan, LLB '33, and Robert J. Webb, LLB '11.

New Students... Age 5

Back in the days of Creighton's founders, the original "college" was no more than a grade school. Children between the ages of 5 and 12 roamed the pasture that became the university's campus.

The kids are back again this summer, studying not reading, 'riting, and 'rithmetic, but Spanish! Miss Delizia Rindone, member of Creighton's staff, is conducting the class.

Cardinal Tien Honored

Creighton University's 32nd honorary degree was conferred May 9 in a simple ceremony on His Eminence, Thomas Cardinal Tien, newly elevated Chinese prelate.

Cardinal Tien received the degree of Doctor of Laws, *honoris causa*, from the Very Rev. William H. McCabe, S.J., president of Creighton, in a simple ceremony in the president's parlor.

The degree was conferred on the new cardinal "because he is a distinguished and beloved representative of

a great people, and his Christ-like qualities of sacerdotal humility and episcopal simplicity and apostolic zeal brought to him an honor never before come to the Orient."

Father McCabe also announced that Creighton was offering two scholarships to the Cardinal, to be given to deserving Chinese students.

His Eminence stopped in Omaha on the way back to his native China. He came from Rome, where he was created a Cardinal by the Holy Father. He is the first Chinese to be elevated to the rank of Prince of the Church.

Dues Fund System

New Faculty Men

A familiar figure is again roaming the halls of the Hilltop after a war-enforced absence of more than three years.

The Rev. Patrick G. Kelly, S.J., has returned to Creighton as instructor in English.

Father Kelly entered Army service in April, 1946, as a chaplain. He spent 28 months overseas with the 56th General Hospital and the Sixteenth Major Port unit.

Four battle stars decorate Father Kelly's ETO ribbon. He received them for the battles of Normandy, Northern France, the Rhine, and the Bulge. He was placed on inactive duty as a major.

Lt. Col. Victor E. Levine, MD '28, has returned to his post as head of the department of bio-chemistry after his release from the service. Dr. Levine was stationed in Alaska where he was carrying on research in the field of nutrition. The Creighton professor spent several years in Alaska before the war in this work for the U.S. Public Health Service.

Dr. Nicholas Dietz, Jr., has also resumed his post as assistant professor of bio-chemistry in the Medical School. Dr. Dietz was discharged from the Army's Medical Corps with the rank of captain. He spent over three years in North Africa, Italy, France and Germany. He was a member of a team making nutritional surveys of the peoples of war-torn Europe. For a time, Dr. Dietz was instructor of preventative medicine at the Medical Service School center just outside of Paris.

Newcomer to the staff is Dr. Frank R. Barta, AB '35. Dr. Barta will join the neuropsychiatry department. He entered service in 1943, and served as head of a neuro-psychiatric hospital. The instructor is a graduate of Johns Hopkins, and took post-graduate work at Yale and the University of Chicago. Dr. Barta spent three years in the service, and was discharged as a major. He served as director of the mental hygiene clinic at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

Dr. John J. Prusmack has been added to the staff of the Medical School as instructor in neuro-psychiatry.

A graduate of the University of Louisville, Dr. Prusmack served his in-

ternship at St. Joseph's Hospital in 1937.

Before entering the service, he was superintendent of the state hospital at Clarinda, Iowa. In 1941 he was called to the army, and served as chief psychiatrist at several posts before coming to Fort Crook as commanding officer of the hospital, and consulting psychiatrist for this area.

Dr. Prusmack was discharged with the rank of lieutenant colonel. He has opened offices in the City National Bank building here.

After 18 months overseas, Dr. Maynard Greenberg has returned to his position as assistant professor of ophthalmology in the Medical School. Dr. Greenberg, a lieutenant colonel, was in charge of the 180th General Hospital's eye, ear, nose and throat clinic.

In the Hilltop schools, George A. Hey was named instructor in English, and Raymond D. Shaffer was appointed instructor in accounting in the College of Commerce. Mr. Shaffer previously taught at St. Ambrose College, while Mr. Hey spent four years in the service as a captain.

Radio Institute

New Equipment Added

An example of the facility which these machines make possible can be seen from the fact that addressing the *Alumnus* envelopes formerly took about fifteen hours and can now be done in three hours.

A third machine which will be of further assistance in maintaining these lists has been on order for some time and is expected daily. An electrically driven Graphotype, it stamps the metal plates which bear the alumni addresses. The machine is operated from a typewriter keyboard.

In addition to the Alumni address file, various lists for publicity purposes and for the distribution of University Bulletins are maintained in the Alumni Office.
