Hollenbach is the Margaret O'Brien Flatley professor of Catholic Theology at Boston College and has been called "the preeminent Catholic social ethicist in the U.S." Fr. Hollenbach will speak on "The Catholic University and the Common Good." The lecture series is sponsored by the Justice and Peace Studies program to remember and honor Fr. John Markoe, S.J., and the St. Martin De Porres Club, Creighton pioneers in nonviolent action for racial justice. The 7:30 p.m. lecture in the Student Center ballroom will be followed by a reception.
