Resolutions Adopted at N. W. D. A. Meeting.

RESOLVED, That we recommend that wholesale druggists individually protest against the action of those manufacturers who sell buying clubs on jobbers' terms. The services of the jobbers are indispensable to the manufacturer. It is clearly good business policy for the manufacturer to deal fairly and not foster a movement which tends to deprive the jobber of a considerable part of his best trade while, at the same time, using him as a convenience to supply the remainder of the retailers.

RESOLVED, That as the retail druggist has in the past, does now and always will depend on the regular wholesale druggist as his channel of supply for a large proportion of his wants, we are convinced that the efforts of a certain part of the retail trade to eliminate the second clause of the excellent motto of the N. A. R. D., "Live and Let Live," is destructive of the best interests of both the retailer and the wholesaler.

RESOLVED, That these three resolutions and that portion of the committee's report which refers to buying clubs be printed and sent to manufacturers and the drug journals for publication.

Value of Good Newspaper Ads.

Don't waste any time worrying about what sort of novelty advertising will pay until you have the newspapers running all the good ads for you that it will pay you to use in them.

Manufacturers of Proprietary Medicines are certainly not treating the jobbing druggists and retail druggists as they should. 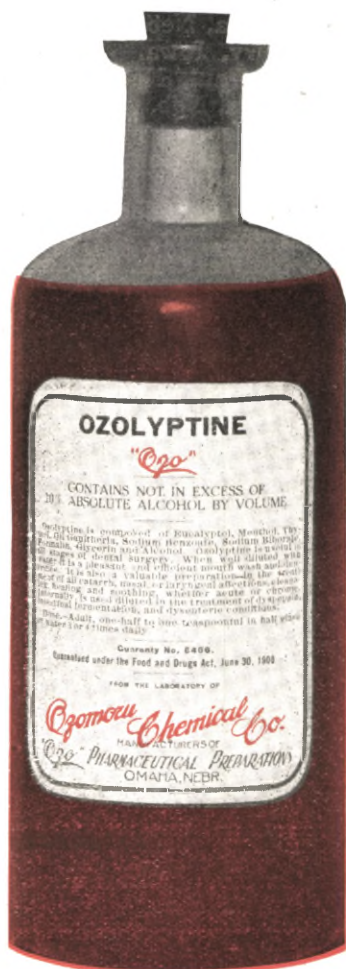

Texas State Board of Pharmacy Meeting.

At a regular meeting of the Texas Board of Pharmacy called to convene at Austin, on Sept. 15th, there were present a full attendance of the Board.

The meeting was called to order by W. H. Robert, Jr. The minutes of last meeting, held in Waco, were read and unanimously approved.

There being twenty-five applicants in waiting for examination, the Secretary was instructed to make due preparation for same. Each applicant was given the application blank he had filled out and filed with the Secretary and seated at a table to himself, numbers were then prepared from one to twenty-five, placed in a hat and each applicant was requested to draw a number from the hat. Then the Secretary took up all the applications and marked in large figures upon the back of each application the number the applicant had drawn, and each applicant was instructed to sign his examination papers with his number, as the examiners would grade each paper and mark percentage opposite the number signed at the bottom of each paper. The board determined that it was the most satisfactory method to be used.

THE EFFECT OF BENZOIC ACID AND BENZOATES ON DIGESTION.

As Result of Long Series of Experiments Department of Agriculture Draws Conclusions Unfavorable to the Use of the Preservatives—a Synopsis of the Report.

Washington, D. C.

The Department of Agriculture has issued a report embracing the final conclusions to be drawn from a long series of experiments designed to show the effect on digestion and health of benzoic acid and benzoates as commonly used in the preservation of food products. The deductions from these tests are decidedly unfavorable to the use of the preservatives referred to, which are declared to be both unnecessary and distinctly injurious to the health. Following is a synopsis of the report:

"This investigation is of special importance because of the opinion held by many manufacturers, food officials and consumers that benzoic soda and benzoate are probably the least harmful of the preservative substances employed. It is believed for this reason there has been a very large increase in the use of these preservatives in the last few years, with a corresponding decrease of the amount of other preservative substances employed. It has also been claimed that there can be no reasonable objection to the use of benzoic acid by reason of its natural occurrence in many food products, either in traces or natural quantities. Among the products cited the cranberry occupies the most prominent position because of the notable amount of benzoic acid it contains. These considerations, however, had no determining influence on the choice of this substance for the experimental work, inasmuch as it was included in the original scheme.

"The delay which has attended the presentation of this report for publication has been due to several causes. First, the great burden of collating the data, condensing the analytical tables, and checking the data for accuracy, required, as usual in such cases, a large amount of time and expert labor. There were also a number of points brought out in the investigations which required further study of the question, both experimentally and in consulting authorities thereon.

"Another reason for the delay consisted in the fact that various representations were making on the part of manufacturers and others respecting the effect upon the industries using benzoic acid should the conclusions reached in this report receive executive and judicial confirmation. It was thought advisable, therefore, to give ample time to the industries involved to experiment with methods of manufacture looking to the elimination of objectionable preservatives. Investigations were also undertaken by this bureau in collaboration with the manufacturing interests along the same line. Results of these investigations have shown that there is not a single article of food which has been commonly preserved by means of benzoic acid or benzoate of soda which cannot be preserved and offered to the consumer in perfect condition without the aid of any chemical preservative. This fact has been completely demonstrated in the case of cider and grape juice, mincemeat, jelly, jams, catsups, preserves and other articles of the same character, and there seems, therefore, to be no longer any industrial reason for delaying publication even if the former necessity for such delay be admitted.

"It is believed that the distribution of results of this investigation at the present time will neither work hardship to any manufacturing interest nor interfere in any way with any legitimate business. At the same time it will indicate to the manufacturer, as well as to the consumer, the important truth that the use of the benzoic acid and benzoate of soda as a preserving medium is not without danger, that its effects are always injurious or tend to injure, and that its exclusion from food products is desirable not only in order to conform to the food and drugs act but also for hygienic reasons.

"The greater care which is required in the manufacture of food products without the use of benzoic acid or benzoate of soda, necessitating the use of a higher quality of raw material, will place the industries which would otherwise use these preservatives in foods on a better plane, and secure for their products a greater consumption.

GENERAL CONCLUSIONS.

"From a careful study of the data in the individual cases and of the summaries of the results, it is evident that the administration of benzoic acid, either as such or in the form of benzoate of soda, is highly objectionable and produces a very serious disturbance of the metabolic functions, attended with injury to digestion and health.

"As in the case of boric acid, salicylic acid, and sulphurous acid, this injury manifests itself in a number of different ways, both in the production of unfavorable symptoms and in the disturbance of metabolism. These injurious effects are evident in the medical and clinical data, which show grave disturbance of digestion, attended by pneumonia which are clearly indicative of irritation, nausea, headache, and, in a few cases, vomiting. These symptoms were not only well marked, but they were produced upon healthy individuals, receiving good and nourishing food and living under proper sanitary conditions. It is only fair to conclude, therefore, that under similar conditions of administration of benzoic acid or

benzoate of soda in the case of weaker systems, or less resistant conditions of health, much more serious and lasting injury would be produced.

"It was also noticed that the administration of benzoic acid and benzoate of soda was attended with a distinct loss of weight, indicative of either a disturbance of assimilation or an increased activity in those processes of the body which result in the destruction of tissue. The production of a loss of weight in cases of this kind must be regarded as indicative of injurious effects.

"The influence of the benzoic acid and benzoate of soda upon metabolism was never of character indicative of a favorable change therein. While often the metabolic changes were never marked, such changes as were established were of an injurious nature. It is evident that the administration of these bodies, therefore in the food tends to derange metabolism in an injurious way. An important fact in connection with the administration of these bodies is found in the efforts which nature makes to eliminate them from the system. In so far as possible the benzoic acid is converted into hippuric acid. There is a tendency usually manifested, however, to retain the benzoic acid in the body for a notable length of time, and this is much more marked in the case of benzoate of soda than in the case of benzoic acid.

"While the administration of both of these bodies, therefore, is undoubtedly harmful, the injurious effects are produced more rapidly in the case of benzoic acid than they are in the case of benzoate; the data, however, will show that the total harmful effect produced in the end is practically the same in both cases; hence there appears to be no reason for supposing that the administration of the preservative in the form of benzoate of soda can be justified by any argument relating to the less injurious effect thereof upon health.

"The occurrence of microscopic bodies in the urine is undoubtedly increased under the administration of benzoic acid in both forms, thus showing conclusively the tendency to stimulate the destructive activities of the body.

"Coming to the final consideration of all of these different phases of the subject, there is only one conclusion to be drawn from the data which have been presented, and that is that in the interests of health both benzoic acid and benzoate of soda should be excluded from food products. This conclusion is reached independently of any consideration of the conditions which it is alleged surround the processes of manufacture and which result in the demands of manufacturers to be allowed to continue the use of these substances. This is a subject which must be discussed from an entirely different point of view and has no bearing whatever on the general conclusions which have been reached, namely, that both benzoic acid and benzoate of soda are bodies which when added to foods, are injurious to health."—Oil Paint and Drug Reporter.

chemistry which, according to Avogadro's law, the law of definite proportions, the law of multiple proportions, etc., is an exact science, while medicine is not considered a true science but an art. So in the light of the foregoing facts why should not the educational requirements of the pharmacist be on a level with those of the physician?

I have been engaged in the practice of medicine for the past fifteen years, during the first seven years of which contrary to my desire, I dispensed my own medicine for no other reason than the lack of proficiency of the only druggist in the town in which I practiced.

During the last eight years I wrote prescriptions and dispensed no drugs whatever except at the bedside for the reason that my druggist was a man on whom I could depend. He had the education and could show where he obtained it. When he told me that he could make as good an emulsion of cod liver oil as some of the proprietary emulsions I believed him because I was from Missouri, and he had shown me on several different occasions. He showed me that he could compound a prescription containing tincture of cinchona and some iron preparation which would not be mistaken for ink. He showed me that when I prescribed a granular effervescent salt which he did not have on hand at that time he could make it for me, and what's more make it right. He having shown me these things I was ready and anxious to be shown that the official cataplasms of kaoline which he could make was as good as a more expensive but not more efficient preparation of that character which has made Denver famous and the word mud less obnoxious. He showed me the same thing with other preparations in consequence of which I had all the confidence in the world as to his ability.

He also being from Missouri, was willing to be shown, consequently I showed him that when I prescribed Squibb's ergot, Squibb's chloroform or specified any particular kind of drug that was what I wanted and my wishes were always respected. In that way we got along as lovely as two kittens.

That pharmacist today will tell you that I did more for his store than any physician ever did, and I will tell you that he did more for me than any pharmacist ever did.

In closing this article I wish to say that from personal observations and careful consideration of this question I am forced to conclude that the harmony or discord, which ever it may be, existing between physician and pharmacist is more a question of education than of legislation.

Left-Over Fruit Juices.

Pharmacists who close their fountain in the fall should be careful in buying their stock of fruit juices toward the close of the soda season, in order to avoid accumulating a large excess to carry over until spring, as is often the case. The stock should be reduced to a minimum. Whatever is left on hand should be most carefully taken care of and not allowed to spoil by neglect, as too often happens. It should be placed at once in suitable jugs or bottles, which should be filled to the cork, then tightly corked and securely sealed. The vessels should be kept in the cellar, or other cool place, until the soda season opens in the spring, when they should be opened and the juices carefully inspected and tested as to their condition. Any that may have become stale or impaired in flavor, and not in prime condition, should be discarded, as any attempt to use them at the fountain would be injurious to the business.

If among your excess of stock of juices in the fall you should happen to have some unbroken packages which have not been kept on hand too long, you might through the courtesy of your wholesale dealer, get him to allow you to return them to be exchanged for other goods or to be credited to your account until you commenced to purchase your stock of juices for the spring business.—J. B. Moore in West. Drug.

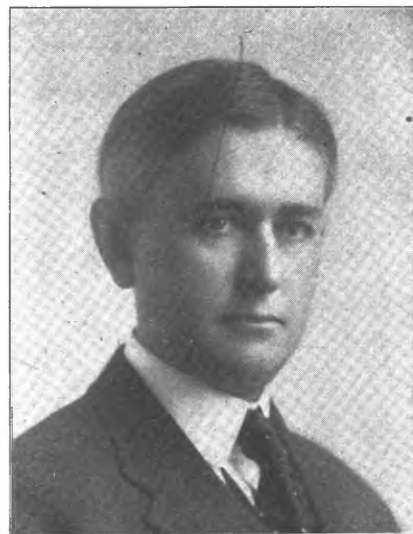
Inference in Advertisements.

While it is well to realize that the average of human intelligence is by no means high and that advertising statements must be made explicit, it is also true that much valuable space is wasted through useless repetitions and superfluous words. Thus, "For sale at Smith's Drug Store," may sometimes be found repeated half a dozen times on a small folder or single sheet flyer, when as a matter of fact, the single and simple, but prominently displayed name and address of the advertiser would be quite sufficient, and carry the necessary information. Another method of wasting space is in the use of chains of adjectives almost identical in meaning. The writer recently noted an advertisement of a retail druggist's own skin specialty in which he stated that it was: "Pure, harmless, non-poisonous, free from mineral substances, safe and unadulterated." Excepting that the words "Facial Cream" formed part of the name of the specialty, there was not a word to indicate its uses and the advertisement did not even mention the price.

Freshening Up Rubber Goods.

Perhaps nothing sold in a drug store assumes a soiled and "second hand" appearance more quickly than atomizer bulbs, hot water bottles, and other rubber articles which the customers handle. Rubber is very easily soiled, showing fingers-marks and dirt. The delicate powder finish comes off. To restore the original appearance of the goods, wipe them with a flannel cloth slightly moistened with gasoline.

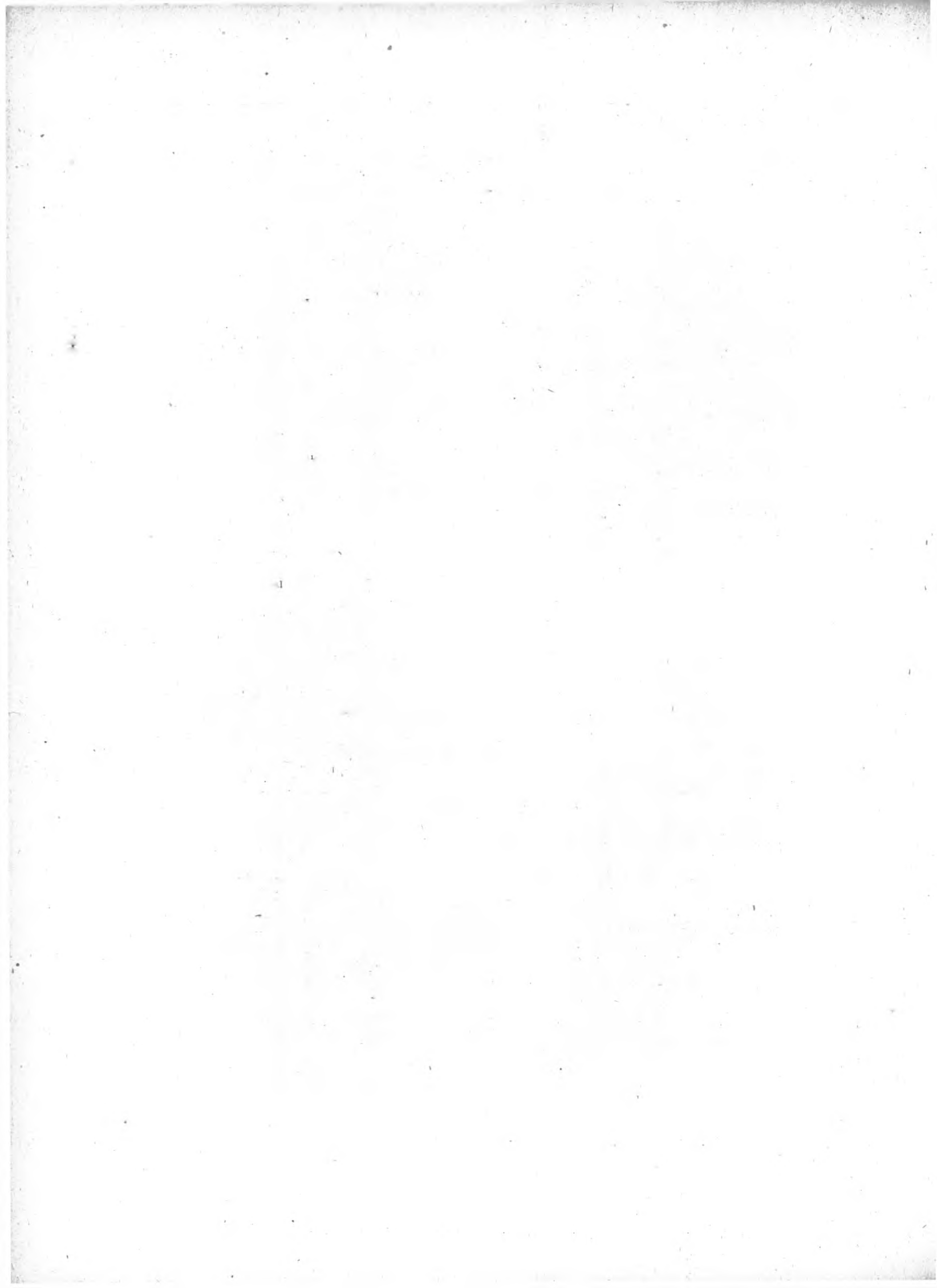
