UNION SPARES NO EFFORTS TO MAKE BALL SUCCESSFUL

Committee Expects Four Hundred Couples to Attend Dance

With the Union Carnival only a few days off, Creighton students are making arrangements to drop all studies for the time being, and expend all their effort toward making the carnival all that it should be. One of the outstanding features of the carnival, and the affair that is being looked forward to with much anticipation is the Union dance next Saturday evening. The committee in charge expects 400 couples to attend.

Extravagant plans have been made in order that the dance will surpass anything of its kind given by the Union this year. The decoration committee were hard at work as early as Wednesday, beautifying the gym. Blue and white streamers will be strung from the center beam, to the iron rail on the track, giving the hall the appearance of a huge tent. The music will be placed in the east end of the gym. Spinharney's eight-piece orchestra will play for the occasion.

Interest is running high, as to just who has been elected to Alpha Sigma Tau. Those lucky ones have already been selected, but their names will not be divulged until the evening of the ball. The newly chosen members will be taken out of the grand march, and formally accepted into the fraternity, in the presence of all those attending the dance.

A ritual has been prepared for the formal installation of the newly elected Board of Governors, and the ceremonies will be impressive. The committee plans to have the features of the evening come first, so that the rest of the evening may be devoted to dancing.

The gym floor will be washed next Friday, and well waxed, so that it will be in excellent condition by Saturday evening. The dance will be open only to Union members and their ladies, and no outsiders will be granted admission.

GLEE CLUB PLANS TO GIVE PUBLIC CONCERT

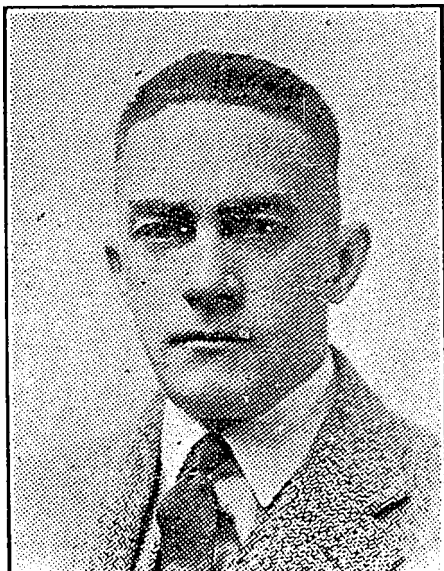

SECURE SPLENDID PROGRAM FOR C. U. MUSIC FESTIVAL

Prominent local Musicians and School Talent to Take Part

The Creighton University Union has shown on various occasions that it knew how to prepare entertainments of an unusual and pleasing nature, but in the past these affairs have been planned only for the enjoyment of student body or alumni, and sometimes for the mutual enjoyment of both groups.

On Friday evening the Union will offer a new type of entertainment not only to Creighton students and alumni, but to the public at large. The program for that evening has been called the Creighton Music Festival, and it is believed that the University auditorium will be filled with a large audience, who will leave Creighton with a vivid impression of the Creighton Union as a worth-while organization. No admission will be charged.

The program will begin promptly at 8:20 p. m., with a prelude by the Creighton University Orchestra. The Glee Club will give several songs, followed by Sammy Carmell, youthful violinist.

Stanley Jan Letovsky, prominent local pianist, will give a number; and Irma Swift Oberreuter, vocalist and director of Our Lady of Lourdes choir, will sing several selections accompanied by Karl Tunberg. Mr. Letovsky will then play a second piano number.

The Creighton Saxophone Sextette will make their first public appearance of the year at this concert. They have been practicing four times weekly in preparation for the Public Glee Club

DENTAL AND PHARMACY SCHOOLS PLAN DEPARTMENT BANQUETS FOR SENIORS

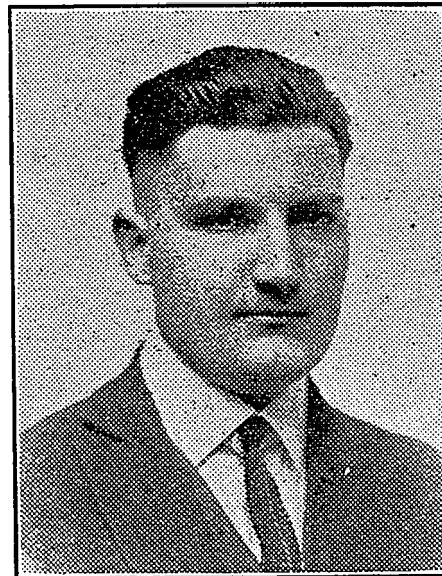

NEW UNION BOARD ELECTS OFFICERS FOR COMING YEAR

Brown President; Foley, Kelley, Anderson Get Other Offices

Although the election of officers on the newly elected Union Board should not, according to the constitution, occur until the regular meeting on the first Monday of May, the election of these officers took place at a special meeting called by President Albert Stevens on Tuesday evening. This was done in order to facilitate the introduction of the new board at the Final Union Ball on Saturday evening.

Brendan Brown of the Law college received the presidency of the 1923-24 Board, and thereby that of the Union. Mr. Brown resides in Omaha.

John Foley of Rodman, Iowa, Arts representative on the board, was elected to serve as its vice-president. Linae Anderson of the Dental school is the newly chosen secretary; and John Kelley, Commerce delegate, will be entrusted with the care of the Union treasury. Both men are residents of Omaha.

President Stevens presided over the election, and Adolph Swoboda, present Commerce representative, had charge of the balloting.

The original board will guide the destinies of the Union until May Day. For that reason various committees, such as House, Activities, and Finances, were not appointed at this special meeting. The new board will appoint these committees at its first regular meeting to be held on May 7.

C. U. PLACES THREE IN ENGLISH CONTEST

In the annual Intercollegiate English Contest, Creighton outdistanced all competitors by winning three places. Frank P. Fogarty, Arts Freshman, and City Editor of the "Creightonian," was Creighton's ranking entrant by virtue of winning third place. James Smith, Arts Sophomore, was next in order, with fourth place, and Francis R. Byrne, Sophomore in the Arts, and Verse Editor of "Shadows," tied for tenth. First place was won by Joseph Meyer of St. Xavier's College, Cincinnati, and second by Robert J. Murphy of St. John's College, Toledo, Ohio. Creighton was the only school to win three places.

The subject assigned for this year's contest was "The Need of Religion In Modern Education." Twelve colleges and universities of the Missouri Province of the Jesuit Order were entered in the competition. A purse of \$100, donated by Mr. D. F. Brenner of Chicago, will be divided up as follows: First place, \$50; second, \$20; third, \$15; fourth, \$10; fifth, \$5.

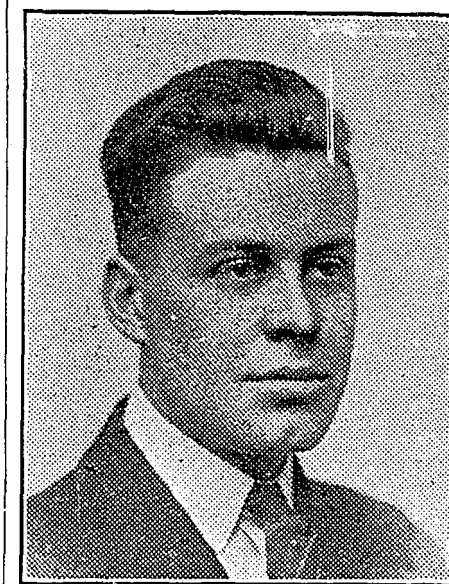
**Mr. Schabinger Must Have

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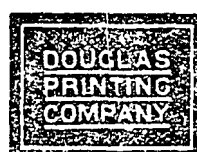


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FATHER McCABE NEW LIBRARIAN

An important addition was made to the Creighton faculty recently, when the Rev. James McCabe, S.J., former President of St. Mary's college, and of St. Xavier's college, Cincinnati, came here to take the place left vacant by the death of Father Kinsella. Father McCabe comes to Creighton with a wonderful record of achievement in every community in which he has been stationed. At St. Xavier's he inaugurated a building program which resulted in the erection of a new Administration Building, a new stadium, a dormitory, and a Science Hall. At St. Mary's, where he was President from 1897 to 1907, he instituted a similar program which made St. Mary's one of the leading boarding schools in the west. In addition, he has served as Prefect of studies at Detroit University and Marquette.

Father McCabe was ordained by Cardinal Gibbons in 1894. This is his first extended stay in Omaha, although he passed through here enroute to Woodstock in 1889. He remarked on the wonderful change that has taken place in town and college since his last visit here.

Father McCabe will act in the double capacity of librarian and chaplain at Creighton.

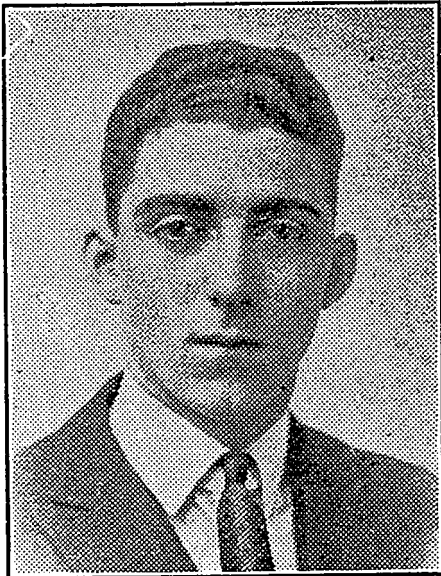
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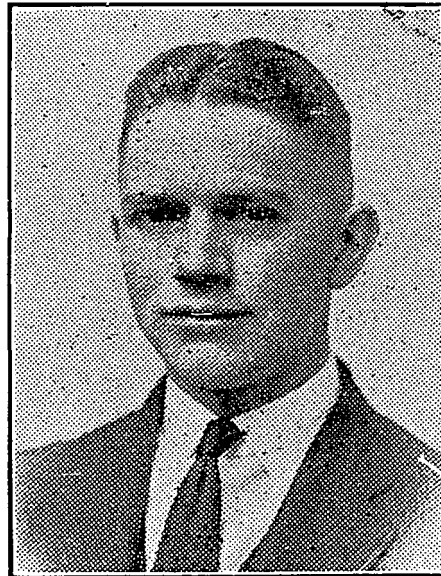

**LAW DEAN MAKES
KNOWN GRADES FOR
LAST EXAMINATIONS**

The long-awaited grades for the Winter Quarter examinations of the Law school, which took place March 11-14, were given out Tuesday afternoon by Dean Te Poel.

Sam Beber kept his lead of last quarter in the Senior class with an average grade of 94 3-7%, while Ralph Swoboda followed close behind with 94 1-7%.

In the Junior class, Brendan Brown averaged 93 5-12%, and Fred White 89 2-3%, White having taken second place last quarter, and Brown third.

O. T. Doerr led the Freshman class with an average grade of 92 5-6%. J. Vojir and G. Truman tied with 91- 2%. Both kept the positions they held last quarter.

The race was much closer this quarter than last, and the grades of the leaders were generally lower than those received during the first semester exams.

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**C. U. GRADS ACCEPT
MAYO FELLOWSHIPS**

Two graduates of Creighton Medical School, class of '22, were among the twenty-five doctors chosen by the Mayo Fellowship Committee for fellowships in the Mayo clinical hospital at Rochester, Minn.

Applications for these positions came from every part of the United States, and it is quite an honor for Creighton that two of her former students have attained the coveted appointments. This is not the first time that Creighton men have been accepted by the Mayo hospital.

Dr. Harry A. Collins and Dr. John Gardiner, who graduated from Creighton last June, will leave for Rochester June 1. Since graduation both men have been serving internships at St. Joseph's Hospital in this city.

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
