Jesuit Mission/Identity & Ignatian Pedagogy Blueline Course

History: Two years ago several faculty and chaplains in the Health Professional Schools began working on an Interdisciplinary Online Course for students on Ignatian Spirituality and Values. Although that course did not come to fruition, it was transformed into a faculty development opportunity as a project for the Jesuit Seminar. Originally designed with health professionals in mind, faculty in other professions have taken the course and found it to be of great benefit.

Course Content:

This course is an introduction to Ignatian Values, Ignatian Pedagogy and the Jesuit Mission as related to higher education, as well as an opportunity for those who are familiar with these to increase knowledge and deepen their appreciation and application.
