**PROFESSIONAL NOTES:** ■ Two Creighton University faculty members recently received Cottrell College Science Awards to fund basic scientific research. **Dr. Martin Hulce**, associate professor of Chemistry, received a \$15,750 grant for his research project, entitled "conformationally directed alkylation of ambient allenyl enolates." **Dr. Sam Cipolla**, professor of Physics, received a \$13,950 award for his research, entitled "MX-ray cross sections by low energy protons." ■ **Dr. Jean DeMartinis**, assistant professor in the School of Nursing, received the District II Celebrate Nursing award as the representative of the School of Nursing. ■ **Mary Kuhlman**, adjunct instructor of English, presented a paper, "Effects of Town Life on Women in Elizabeth Gaskell's Novels," at the Conference on Women Writers of 18th and 19th Century Britain, at the University of Washington on May 7.
