**LABORATORY SAFETY REMINDER:** Use a hood when working with any volatile substance with a TLV of less than 50 ppm. Keep materials stored in hoods to a minimum and do not allow stored materials to block the vents or air flow. Report any malfunction of a hood to the Physical Plant. Hoods are certified annually by contract. If you are uncertain whether general laboratory ventilation will be sufficient, leave the hood on when it is not in active use. Reference 29CFR1910. If you have any questions regarding hood safety, contact Environ-

mental Health and Safety, 449-6400.
